BEER AND WINE LICENSE WILL SUIT DEALERS

Niagara Falls Hotelmen do not wish to go back to old System of Open Bar With a Whiskey Privilege.

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 14.—The consensus of opinion among the Niagara Falls hotel men is that a wine and beer license would be quite satisfactory.

"We certainly don't want to go back to the old order of the liquor business," said one prominent hotelman today, in answer to inquiries as to his views regarding Hon. Mr. McGarry's announcement as to a referendum on the liquor question in September next.

"I don't think," he added, "you will find many hotelmen in Ontario who would want to go back to the liquor business the way it was before prohibition. What I would like to see, and this is the opinion of hotelmen of this city, and I believe of the Province generally, is a beer and light wine license, with the proper dispensation by the Government of these liquors. GEORGE STORM IS ARRESTED BY CAMP M.P.

Deserted From his Battalion Last June and Will Now Face a Court Martial for the Offence.

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 14.—A young farmer named George Storm was arrested Wednesday night by Inspector Tolmie's Dominion Police. Storm has given the authorities plenty of trouble since he deserted from Niagara Camp last June. He was arrested last night at his farm not far from Welland. Storm was given a month's leave of absence to do his settlin' last May; and on returning to Niagara Camp he asked for another leave to work on his farm. This was refused, so he took French leave. His uniform was subsequently found hidden in the woods and may attempts have been made to get him. Wednesday night a couple of Inspector Tolmie's men rushed Storm's house and caught him as he was taking boiled eggs out of the pot for his supper. He surrendered quietly. He was turned over to the military authorities and will be court martialed.

FAVOR MORE PLAY GROUNDS FOR THE CITY

Trades and Labor Council Disapprove of Expenditure of Money for Deputation to New York City.

A large attendance of delegates were present at the regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night, President Greenlaw presiding. Organizer Riley, of the Machinists was present and gave one of his usual interesting talks on industrial conditions. Another welcome visitor was Mr. Crompton, Fair Wage Officer, who gave a splendid address on educational affairs, a question he stated which should engage the close attention of all citizens. Mr. Crompton's remarks were highly appreciated by all the delegates.

Peter Grant, reporting on behalf of the Municipal Committee, expressed great pleasure in the improved conditions at the children's shelter according to the inspectors report, but the committee desire that the investigation report resulting from the mild sensation at the end of last year, be made public. The committee claim if the inspector was then in error it is only fair that the good names of other people should be freed from suspicion.

The committee expressed disapproval of the recent visit to the Good Roads convention in New York City of Alderman Smith and the City Engineer. The committee whilst commending Ald. Smith for bringing in a comprehensive report, claim that at a time when economy was so much preached that the visit was a waste of public money and that all the information procured could have been had by the expenditure of a few cents in postage stamps. The committee also brought forward the case of a citizen, who during the time the city was threatened with a coal famine, had an opportunity of securing several cars of coal and on getting them to the city, was by some red tape in not being able to get a license, unable to dispose of it. The committee commend this citizen on his public spirited action in attempting to help the people in times of distress and are further investigating the matter.

The report was adopted and the committee complimented on the good work they are engaged in.

For Labor Day Several delegates reported their locals were enthusiastic about arrangements for Labor Day.

Delegates Cheevers was the means of starting a lively discussion on the question of the abolition of property qualifications for the holding of municipal offices. The secretary was instructed to write the City Council on the matter urging them to petition the government to amend the Municipal Act.

A deputation was appointed consisting of F. Greenlaw, Jas. A. Wiley and the Municipal committee to attend the next meeting of the City Council to present their case why the property qualification should be abolished.

The question of the Lacrosse Grounds was dealt with and it was decided to ask the City Council to attempt to open more sport or playgrounds throughout the city rather than spend money on the Lacrosse grounds. Delegate Jas. Milne, who is one of the city's favorite footballers, pleaded eloquently on behalf of the cricket and football fans and stated that if we had more playgrounds in the city we would have less crime. It was intimated that at the next meeting there would be a general discussion on technical education.

INSURRECTION IN BERLIN HAS BEEN SUPPRESSED

SOME BRIDES FRIGHTENED AT STORIES

21,000 Canadians Have Married in England and the Number is Increasing.

London, Feb. 22.—(Delayed)—Some agitation is raging in England today over the reports of maltreatment of English brides reaching the Dominions. Some English girls are refusing now to accompany their husbands to Canada, having been frightened by the reports and by stories of Canadian hardships.

Lawyers in London who are making a specialty of Canadian work report that some cases of domestic infelicity have arisen with these new brides. Examination of these reports shows that often it is the men who are seeking legal advice.

That the Canadians in England are marrying in large numbers is certain the estimate is that 21,000 Canadians have married in England, compared with only 7,000 Australians and 2,000 New Zealanders. At the present time the Bishop of London's Marriage License Registry at Doctor's Commons is being besieged by demobilized Canadians to an extent, it is reported, of 12 to 14 an hour.
