THE WEEK IN PARLIAMENT.

In Parliament this week, Hon. A. G. Blair's railway commission bill was practically finished so far as the committee stage was concerned.

Hon. William Mulock's estimates were considered for three days and it was shown that the postoffice department has been the headquarters for a lot of political grafters.

The Postmaster General refused to increase the miserable salaries paid to rural mail drivers and postoffice keepers.

The Minister announced that he had abandoned his rural postal delivery scheme, which he faithfully promised to inaugurate.

In caucus, the Liberal party adopted a policy by which the government undertakes to construct a railway line for the Grand Trunk Pacific, which will cost \$75,000,000.

Hon. W. S. Fielding gave notice of resolutions providing for bounties on iron and steel billets, structural steel, wire rods and rolled plates.

Bounties will also be extended to binder twine and lead.

All of these payments will be chargeable to the public debt.


