previously on the order paper of private members, were discussed On this occasion almost all the discussion was in the direction of better conditions for the returned soldiers. The first resolution in this direction was advanced by Mr. McCurdy of Colchester, N. S. This resolution asked for preferential treatment in Civil Service appointments for disabled soldiers. It need not be said that this met with very strong support in the House, practically all the members on the Government side, at least, favoured this. After the matter had been fully discussed by the mover and other members of the House on the Government side, the Hon. A. K. MacLean, speaking for the Government, stated that everything that had been said was quite in line with the desire of the Government, to the conditions of the returned soldiers, and to make their advent into the Civil Service as reasonable easy as possible. He said that the Governmedt intended bringing down to the House amendments to the Civil Service Act, which practically incorporated all that the members advanced in the resolution under dis cussion. Under these circumstan ces he thought that possibly the matter would not be pressed to a vote. This idea prevailed and after some words of explanation Mr. McCurdy withdrew his resolution.
