As the wind was very high the captain dropped anchor, and sent a boat's crew in at day-light on Friday morning to try and get a tug. There being no tug available, the captain kept at anchor till Saturday, when at 10 a.m. Captain Babb with the ife boat took Captain Dancey to the Taylor, and with the assistance of that experienced navigator the schooner was guided in safely. During the afternoon the G. T. commenced elevating the Taylor's corgo.
