

Stoves of Iron.

They Superseded the Roman Stuba in the Eighteenth Century.

A heating apparatus called a "stu-(stove) was widely used among the higher classes of Romans before the beginning of the Christian era. This class of heaters was fixed and unmovable, besides being in several other respects wholly different from the modern stove. In Germany and Scandinavia they were used in bathcooms and hothouses during the mid-lle ages. They were usually constructed of brick, stone or tile, and were of immense size. They some-times covered the whole side of a twenty or thirty foot room, and often the oven somewhat fifteen or twenty as ten feet, in which case the smooth flat top was used for a bedstead, the heated surface imparting an agreeable feeling of warmth during


