Supreme Court.

(Before the Chief Justice.)
The Grand Jury were called, and were addressed by the Chief Justice on the matter of the charge of murder against Clara Wheeler. It is charged that the accused murdered her three months old baby. When the Chief Justice had concluded his address the Grand Jury retired to consider their verdict. The Grand Jury is composed of the following:—Isaac Morris, foreman, John March, Wm. Fraser, Thos. Buckley, Tasker Cook, Arthur Haddock, Wm. F. Kiely, John Maund, H. Macpherson, J. V. O'Dea, William Campbell, Patrick Wadden, William Casey, Henry Blair, John Donnelly, David Baird, Chesley Woods, J. H. Thomas, John B. Mitchell, Archibald Gibb.

After the jury had retired the case of Kalem Noah vs. Karl Ryding was resumed. Mr. Noah was in the box and was cross-examined by Mr. Hunt for the defendant. Two other witnesses were called. During the examination of the second witness the Grand Jury returned to Court and their foreman announced that they had found a true bill for manslaughter. The Chief Justice pointed out that he had placed the matter before them as calling for an indictment for murder. The Magistrate had committed the prisoner to trial for murder, and that under the circumstances appearing upon the depositions, he had no alternative but to charge on an indictment for murder. It was, however, now for the Attorney General to deal with the indictment as found.

The Deputy Minister of Justice moved that the prisoner be arraigned tomorrow.

The Court rose till 3 o'clock.

The Premier's Visit to Burgeo

And The Ramea Telegraph Cable.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor.—We have lately heard a great deal concerning the reception accorded Sir Edward Morris in the West Coast. Oh! how these people do sound their own trumpet to be sure; at the same time, Mr. Editor, the people, or at least the great majority of them have ceased to be fooled by such cries. A great cry was also raised by the Tory organs re Sir Edward's reception on the South coast, but if his reception was no better at all over the South Coast than at Burgeo, the Tory organs that accorded him at Burgeo (and there is no reason for believing that it was) then it was not much to blow about. I assure you, in fact, it was not until he had left the place and returned to it a second time that interest enough could be roused in anyone to take any notice of him whatsoever. The effort then made to give him a reception was feeble indeed and by no means a success for the Tories to shout about.

There is one thing, however, Mr. Editor, that is worthy of note in connection with the Premier's visit to Burgeo. He provided laughing matter for the people of Burgeo for the next generations, when he was going to build a road from here to Red Island. Red Island is four miles from here, and by the time he would get to it, he would have a cable across what is locally known as The Devil's Chimney. I think, Sir, that Sir Edward would be looking for another loan. The people of this place, Mr. Editor, have refused to court such givings out. They have refused to jump at a bait through which they can plainly see the barb that would swiftly and surely run them to their ruin. The Premier was soon convinced of the futility of his proposition, and considering that he would still have a place for the spending of an occasional thousand in Burgeo District while the Ramea cable is in existence, he abandoned the idea.

Mr. Editor, I speak of the string laid from Ramea here as a cable because it has some appearance of having been a cable at one time, but if it is worthy the name now and capable of being made to give satisfaction as such, why there can be no doubt as to its having been a telegraph cable at one time, and that it has done honourable service is plainly shown by the number of old wounds and sores it carries, alas! I fear too many to be of any more service.

I would like to ask, Mr. Editor, who ever heard of a Government buying second hand cables before? Did the Bond Government do it? Does the present Government think that anything in that line is good enough for the people of Burgeo District? I assure you, Sir, that the people themselves do not think that it is.

On the arrival of this cable, nearly twelve months ago, people were asking where it came from, if it was a new cable and if those who sold it were cable manufacturers. But now the questions asked are very different and of a much more humorous nature. For my part, Mr. Editor, I think that the whole of these questions can easily be answered in two words viz. Morris was. That is all. It is nothing more or less and the people are at least beginning to tumble to it. Alas! our dear old country. How many thousands of dollars are being spent from her revenues just as wastefully and needlessly as those spent about the so-called Ramea cable. But, Mr. Editor, we know that the time is at hand when the man who saved the country before will be given the chance to save it again and he will do it! Thanking you for space, I am,

LONDON, To-day.
The attitude of Ulster on the Home Rule question and the position of Bonar Law, Leader of the Unionists, becomes important. Bonar Law spoke of possibility of an irreconcilable Ulster during the debate of the Parliament Bill last year, he said: "If the people of this country decide they will make an experiment of Home Rule then and here I must certainly part company with some of my honourable friends in this House, and with some of those who supported me in the constituency I represent. I should say I believe in representative Government, and however much I dislike it, you cannot compel the United Kingdom to keep up the present arrangement against their will and I should say to loyalists 'Ulster you have got to submit. This is the end of the Ulster impasse, says the signers of the Covenant of Unionist support if authority of Home Rule Parliament is refused recognition. The Daily Telegraph referring to persistent rumours in political circles that the Government is negotiating with John Redmond in the hope of finding a way out of the Ulster impasse, says the suggested basis of compromise is to give Ulster the right of exemption from some provisions of the Home Rule Bill under certain conditions. It is said some agreement has been reached."

Terrible Happenings

MAN MISTAKEN FOR BEAR SHOT AND KILLED LAST EVENING NEAR BADGER BROOK.

Late last night the Reid Nfld. Co. had a message from Badger Brook to the effect that a man named Walter Laver who had been working at Grand Falls was accidentally shot by another man named Thomas Langdown, of Badger Brook, while in the woods 4 miles east of Badger Brook. According to the message received by the Reid Nfld. Co. the man was mistaken for a bear and shot at him twice, the two bullets entering the body presumably in vital parts. When the author of the awful affair discovered his mistake he was terrified. The injured man was taken by lumbermen to Badger where he was placed on board a freight train which came along and rushed to Grand Falls where he was placed in Hospital there and the doctors of the place did all they could for him. The bullets fired into him were of 45.70 calibre, the largest used in any rifle. This morning Magistrate Fitzgerald had a wire from Grand Falls apprising him of the death of the unfortunate man. Langdown was placed under arrest and constable Fred Churchill. A post-mortem will be held on the remains and Magistrate Fitzgerald goes out by this evening's train to hold an enquiry into the sad happenings.
