What Will the Governor Do?

After five weeks of protests in the press, a new element was introduced in the situation on Saturday by the call made on the Governor by the Supreme Council of the F. P. U. Messrs. Morison and Blandford have had all this time to consider their position, and they have done nothing. The proper course for them to have pursued would have been to have tendered their resignation to His Excellency the Governor, through the Premier, and have done so immediately they knew of their defeat at the polls. Even Tories complain of their not doing so. Why have they not done so? And why has not Sir Edward Morris asked them for their resignation, if they are not willing to take the initiative themselves, as they should do? As it appears now they are all suffering from the same disease, a love of ill-gotten power, and they will hold on with the grimness of despair, as long as ever they can. Although Messrs. Morison and Blandford were two of the principals who induced Sir Edward Morris to organize a party under the name of a People's Party, they are showing an utter contempt for the decision of their former constituents by holding on to power, and Sir Edward Morris as great a contempt for the Bonavista voters in allowing them to retain their offices.

During the past five weeks we have continued to call attention to this grave outrage on the usage which has long prevailed in Newfoundland that Ministers retire from office when beaten at the polls. We have pointed out that not only have these Ministers not retired, but they have not followed the course of seeking election in other constituencies, and we have pointed out that there is a probability of the storrer Government using the Legislative Council, as a place of Refuge for these ministers defeated at the polls, and discredited by the circumstances of their defeat. The feeling of the people have been incensed by this defiance of their wishes under the peculiar circumstances of the defeat. Mr. Morison was the Minister whose dismissal was

asked for in connection with certain land grants and Mr. Blandford was the Minister of the Crown Lands Department, with a seat in the Executive Council, whose duty it was to be on the alert to guard the interest of the country in Crown Lands. Mr. Morison was not dismissed. Mr. Blandford continued as his colleague and did not insist on his dismissal. Both have been turned down by their constituents. Both are being kept in office, in defiance of that vote of want of confidence at the polls.

Last week brought the matter somewhat ahead. There were present at the Fishermen's Convention some 160 delegates, picked men from about as many Councils. They protested formally against the retention of these ministers. They objected to the Legislative Council being used as a refuge to keep in office any Ministers defeated at the polls. They condemned the increases already made and objected to any further increase in the Legislative Council, and asked for the holding of bye-elections without delay.

Resolutions embodying these objections, protests and requests were passed unanimously by these representatives of 17,000 Union men. These resolutions were brought formally to the attention of the Governor on Saturday morning. The President and Delegates waited on His Excellency who received them and received from them copies of these resolutions. These resolutions are now formally before the Governor who as a matter of course will bring them to the attention of the Premier and the Executive, and who will also send as he is requested such of the resolutions, viz., those that relate to the increases in the Legislative Council, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

We have already been told to wait and see. Well, we are waiting and we hope to see what the Government does when these matters are formally brought up by the Governor.

Potatoes for Newfoundland.



Household Notes

Dried corn at 20c. a pound goes much further than canned corn, and is much more wholesome and better in flavour. When beating the white of eggs be sure that there is no grease on the beater, as it will prevent the eggs from frothing. If water tastes flat after boiling, pour it from one pitcher to another. This will aerate the water and overcome the flatness.

The teaspoonful of lemon juice to a quart of water will make rice very white and keep the grains separate when boiling. The ground about a plant or shrub should be frozen to a depth of at least two inches before winter protection is applied. Parsley plants if moved to a pot or box now, will grow all winter. They should be placed in a sunny window in the kitchen. If convenient, the waffle batter may be made the evening before it is used. The waffles will be lighter and more easily digested.
