Loss of the S. S. Samuel Blandford.

Yesterday the Telegram reported that the s.s. Samuel Blandford, Capt. Wilson, bound here with a cargo of Anthracite coal from New York to Job Bros. & Co., Ltd., her owners, was wrecked to the westward, this information being supplied by the Colonial Secretary. Later in the afternoon Mr. R. B. Job had a message that the ship had struck the "Keys" at St. Mary's and had become a total wreck, the crew escaping in boats to St. Joseph's. Mr. Job then wired for particulars. Mrs. Wilson, wife of the captain, received this message from her husband: "Samuel Blandford struck St. Mary's Keys; all hands well, at Salmonier." Last night the owners of the ship received the following from Salmonier: "Struck the Keys and got off; before we could reach land, stokehold flooded; we left her. Leaving here Saturday evening." The crew will reach town by to-night's train when no doubt details of the loss of the vessel will be learned. A message received this morning stated that she was submerged and starting to go to pieces.

The ill-fated ship was forty-four years old, being formerly the "Newfoundland," was one of our best known sealing vessels and made history in this colony long to be remembered. In the year 1872 she was built and launched at Montreal to the order of Mr. Andrew Allan, then the principal of the Allan Line Co., who used her as a yacht. Subsequently she was engaged as an Allan boat, running the mail service between Halifax and this port. A few years later she took part in the prosecution of our sealfishery, but she was not very successful. In the spring of 1914, when still the s.s. Newfoundland, she figured prominently in a terrible disaster when 77 members of her crew were frozen to death. After that she was purchased by Capt. Davis, of Greenspond, from her then owners, Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Co. In 1915 she was forbidden to prosecute the sealing voyage, being pronounced unseaworthy. She was fitted up and used as a freight carrier by Captain Davis, who, after having the ship 11 months in his possession, during which time he made handsome profits, sold out his interests to Job Bros. & Co., Ltd. The new owners had the ship dry docked and reclassified. Thousands of dollars were spent, rebuilding her above the water line, including the building of a new deck and the attention to her engines. When finished she was re-named the "Samuel Blandford," in memory of the late veteran and successful seal hunter of this country. Last spring she prosecuted the sealfishery with much success. The loss of the ship at this particular juncture, when the tonnage problem is such a vital issue the whole world over, is not only great to the local marine and mercantile fleet, but will be keenly felt by her owners, as it may be mentioned that the ship not long since came out of dry dock at New York where more improvements were made to her at additional expense. She was bound here coal laden when she left her bones in St. Mary's Bay.
