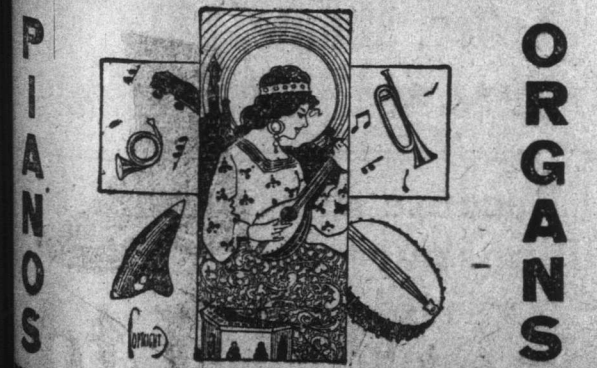

Dangerous Sport.

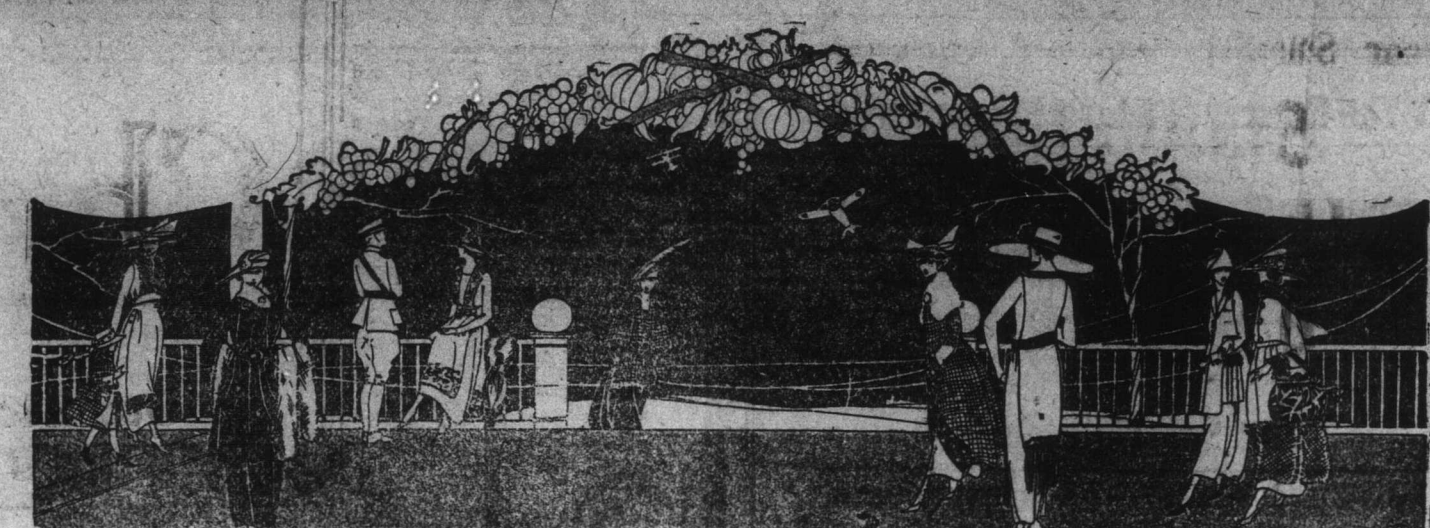
Boys have been noticed playing on
