The Inter-Town Baseball Series at Grand Falls, 1919.

OFFICIAL.

Leaving here by special train at 8:30 on Thursday, Sept. 4, and having the misfortune of a five hours' delay through a broken down freight trucking the line, the St. John's and Grand Falls teams and fans arrived in the inland town in the wee sma's hours of Friday morning, after a most tedious and wearisome journey to some, but to others—the jokers of the party—it was one continuous round of merriment and fun in which burnt cork was quite often brought into use on the more unfortunate members of the party who were embraced in the arms of Morpheus.

The visitors were met on arrival by Manager J. H. Judge, of the Baseball Association, who, with Messrs. Raines, Schroat and Brazil, escorted them to two new bungalows where very comfortable quarters had been specially prepared by the A.N.D. Co., Ltd. Through the kindness of Mr. Berwick arrangements had been made for the special cars containing the party to be brought right into the centre of the town from the main line, thus obviating every discomfort.

Tired after the rather strenuous week and the long journey, most of Friday forenoon found the players of both clubs in bed, but just after lunch Manager D. P. Duff had his team at the ball-park giving them a vigorous work out to take the kinks out of their system and to loosen them up for the fourth game of the inter-town series scheduled for 5 o'clock that afternoon. They found the Grand Falls' diamond very fast (it being what is known as a "skinny" diamond) and altogether different from the slow turf of St. George's Field. The papermen were quite frank in offering suggestions to the City team as to how the ball

Grand Falls—Lockyer was safe on Walter Callahan's error but was out when Murphy worked the "hidden ball" trick on him. McHenry flied to Brett and Fortier biffed. 0 runs.

5th Innings.

St. John's—Sebat Foran now went in the box for the papermen and promptly struck out Kiely. Billy Callahan popped to Fortier, and three fast ones fooled Gossie. 0 runs.

Grand Falls—Billy Callahan's booting the pill let Quick reach first. He promptly stole second, and Braine's safe drive got him third. Cohen laid down a pretty sacrifice and Quick came in. Searles failed to find Hall, and Canning's beautiful peg from third finished Crawley's hopes, and sent the team back to their bench. 1 run.

6th Innings.

St. John's—Hiltz vainly swung the willow; Canning singled but died at the keystone. Hall struck out. 0 runs.

Grand Falls—Hall stopped Foran's drive from the bat; Lockyer's hit was too feeble; McHenry's drive was good for two sacks, and he got to third when Hiltz dropped a strike, but he was left there when Hall gathered up Fortier's rounders. 0 runs.

7th Innings.

St. John's—Walter Callahan vainly smote the air; Cohen lost Murphy's infield fly in a mixup with Foran; Brett couldn't find them, and Kiely skied one to Quick. 0 runs.

Grand Falls—Walter Callahan secured Quick's fly. Claudie fooled Braine but gave Cohen a ride to first. Searle struck out. 0 runs.

8th Innings.

St. John's—Foran was now steaming them over the plate, and sent Billy Callahan back to the bench almost as quickly as he came up. Gossie's crack didn't materialize, and Hiltz couldn't pick one out. 0 runs.

Grand Falls—Crawley flied to Murphy; Foran struck out; Lockyer got to first when he shouldn't have, and reached third on overthrows. Hall passed up McHenry, and gave him hit in the back. 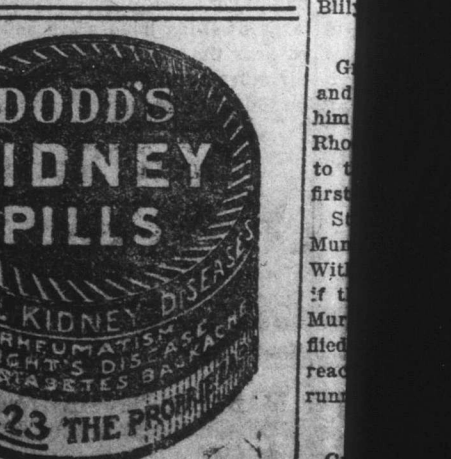
8th INNINGS.
Grand Falls—Crawley flied to Clouston; the "hop" on Brett's fast throw after fielding Sebat Foran's hot rounder was too much for Murphy and he dropped it like a hot cake. Lockyer swung vainly, and Gus Foran's pop fly was got by Clouston. 0 runs.

St. John's—Brett and Gossie hit safely and Billy Callahan was presented with a walk. After a smart run Cohen got Kiely's uplift. Clouston's deep centrefield fly was labelled for an easy 3-bagger with the sacks filled, but was picked up by Braine after a spectacular running catch right on the toes. His impetus bowled him over but he held the ball amid great applause. 1 run.

4th INNINGS.
