C.T.A.N. Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Commercial Travellers' Association of Newfoundland was held in the Board of Trade rooms on Saturday evening last and was well attended. Mr. S. Elliott presided, and seated at his right was Mr. A. W. Miller, Honorary President of the Association.

The reports submitted by the Secretary and Board of Management showed the Association to be in a flourishing condition, and a review of the progress made since the inception of the organization, a feature of which was a remarkable growth in membership, was hailed with satisfaction by the Knights of the Grip present.
