Three Centuries Ago.

"Three centuries ago, in 1620, a little band of English people-men, women, and children-to the number of about one hundred, sailed from Plymouth in a ship called The Mayflower to settle on the bleak and then almost unknown coast of North Am-

"There they landed at a spot where huge stone, one of those ice-borne boulders that strew the low shores of Massachusetts Bay, is said to mark the place at which they stepped ashore, now become a place of pilgrimage to which many come from all over the United States, visiting it with reverence. There this stormtossed and sea-weary company built their huts and a wooden block-house for defence against the native Indians, and prepared to cultivate the

"Not long before an English setlement had been planted in Virginia, and other English colonists came a few years later to another part of the New England coast, where is now the town of Salem. But this Plymouth Settlement (for that was the name they gave it) was the most remarkable of the three, just because was the smallest and weakest, caried out with the least official favour east noticed by the world of its own

The Pilgrims were humble men, one of them persons of any consequence or influence. But the historical significance and moral dignity of an event are not to be measured by the power or honour, or rank. or wealth of those who bear a part in


