As for water, the only supply now came from the pits and hollows outside the wall, in which men, at the risk of their lives, soaked rags and' wrung them out to the last drop. Of the original force, only 350 utterly worn-out men remained with 140 romen and children. while as a crowning blow Haughton himself was severely wounded. 
