Supreme Court.

CRIMINAL SESSION BEGINS.

The Criminal Session of the Supreme Court opened to-day. The Grand Jury attended and were addressed by the Chief Justice on presentments.

Against:—
(1) Augustus Hodder, William Noseworthy, Stewart Noseworthy, who on the 10th day of Nov. riotously assembled together and riotously assaulted various citizens. In all there were six counts.

(2) Two men, Hannaford, and Herbert Chislett who on the 5th day Nov. stole four barrels of meat the property of Thos. Smyth.

(3) Edward O'Neill, John Walsh, John McManus, S. McManus, Thos. McCormack who were charged with breaking and stealing from the store of W. Jackman.

(4) John McManus, Annie McManus charged with receiving stolen property.

The Grand Jury were dismissed at recess hour, to attend again this afternoon.

Obituary.

REV. CANON JOHN MONK NOEL.
(H. F. SHORTIS.)

Mr. William Noel of the Department of Agriculture and Mines received a message at 10 o'clock last night announcing the sad news that his venerable father, Rev. Canon Noel, for many years Rector of St. Paul's Church, Harbor Grace, had passed away. For some time the aged cleric had been an invalid and the end was not unexpected—the reverend gentleman having attained the patriarchal age of 80 years.

Canon Noel was born in St. James' Parish, Westminster, London, England, on the 4th June, 1840, received his education at Archbishop Tenison's Grammar School, London, and arrived in St. John's in 1860, entering Queen's Theological College in this city. He was made deacon in May 1864, and ordained to the priesthood in 1867. In 1864-67 he was incumbent at Ferryland, and had to travel on foot from Petty Harbor to Renewa in carrying out the duties of his sacred calling. From 1868 to 1876 he was priest in charge of the church in Upper Island Cove, where his name is still highly venerated by all classes of the community, and from 1876 to 1915, he was Rector of St. Paul's Church, Harbor Grace, until his retirement in that year. Although retired from his active sacred duties, he officiated on special occasions; in fact, it may be said that he died in harness. In 1895 he was promoted to the high and dignified position of Rural Dean of Conception Bay, and in 1897 was made Canon, being given the stall of St. Boniface in St. John the Baptist Cathedral, St. John's. During all those years, he was absent from active duties in his parishes for only three months, when he visited the scenes of his childhood and early manhood in London in 1905.

The deceased cleric was married to Miss Eliza LeMessurier, daughter of Peter LeMessurier, Esq., for many years accountant of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company in Newfoundland, who, with one son, William and four daughters, Mrs. Smart, wife of Rev. Canon Smart, Heart's Content, Mrs. John T. McEae, Misses Floss and Trixie of Harbor Grace, are left to mourn their great loss.

The venerable octogenarian, zealous and faithful patriarch of the ministry was "constant in season and out of season," as the faithful shepherd, and resigned a life that had been devoted to the cause of his Divine Master. The virtues which shed their halo around the name of this tried and zealous laborer in the Lord's vineyard, will long be remembered in this country, and throughout Conception Bay. In particular, proverbial as it was for that holiness, which, with beacon-light, guides the world's wayward children over the scene of their earthly pilgrimage. Assured we are that amongst all classes the memory of the deceased will be cherished with a veneration due to the exalted piety and to the virtues which adorned a patriarchal and advanced age.

Amongst the long list of priests who officiated in St. Paul's for the past century, Rev. Canon Noel was by many years the clergyman to hold the position for such a lengthy period—forty years. Historic St. Paul's is the oldest church built of stone erected in the Colony. From old records it is gathered that three buildings of wood, preceded it, each of which was successively burnt down through conflagrations which swept the town. After the last disaster the congregation made an effort to build with stone. Enterprising owners of brigs and schooners quarried and brought from Kelly's Island, a large amount of blue stone for the walls. The lime-stone for the window-facings and gables, and afterwards for the battlements of the tower, were imported from the West of England. The portion then erected included only the Nave. A tower was added at a later date. The following items may be of interest:—
A.D. 1832—August 15th: Town of Harbor Grace destroyed by fire, Church of St. Paul burned to the ground.
1835—July 28th: Foundation stone of a new Church laid by Governor Prescott.
1837—July 9th: St. Paul's Church opened.
1840—July 2nd: Church consecrated by Bishop Aubrey Spencer.
1860—June: Transepts and Chancel added and dedicated by Bishop Edward Field.
1897—May 24th: Foundation stone of new Tower laid by Sir Wm. V. Whiteway, K.C.M.G.
1901—Sept. 8th: A new bell dedicated, which afterwards cracked.
1909—Sept. 22nd: Dedication of new windows in the Nave by Bishop La Jones.

1912—Oct. 4th: Dedication of the Bell presented by the late Mrs. R. D. McEae.
On Empire Day, May 24th, 1914, on the Golden Jubilee of his Ministerial life, Canon Noel was presented with an address from the Conception Bay Clerical Association offering him their heartfelt congratulations, and appreciating his long connection with Parochial, Diocesan, and Educational work, and signed by all the members, clerical and lay. His Lordship, Bishop Jones' name at the head of the list. The school children also presented him with an address upon the same occasion.
It may be truly said that old St. Paul's Church was practically rebuilt during the rectorship of the venerable Canon, who for so long watched over the spiritual and temporal welfare of his flock. For over forty years I was honored with the friendship of the deceased churchman, and it was evident to all that he possessed profound learning, high culture and great force of character, unusual intellectual power, deep piety, as well as wonderful administrative and constructive ability, which qualified him to fill the multitudinous duties which fell upon his shoulders, and carry out the great improvements which made St. Paul's Church one of the most beautiful and artistic edifices in the country. Canon Noel was also a voluminous writer both in prose and verse, and his language was copious and elevated, his sentiments just, his actions noble and full of dignity.

The Telegram extends its sincere sympathy to the family, relatives and friends in their bereavement.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

DISCOVERED RIFLES.

BERLIN, Feb. 15. Acting on a clue obtained through a recent seizure of arms in Berlin, the police have discovered two thousand rifles and a quantity of ammunition, concealed in a building, formerly used for military purposes.

EX-EMPRESS STRONGER.

DOORN, Holland, Feb. 15. Although still confined to her bed, former Empress Augusta Victoria, of Germany, is somewhat stronger.

PROVINCIAL REVOLUTION.

LONDON, Feb. 15. A revolution has broken out in the Indian State of Tonk, in Rajputana, says Reuters' despatch from Allahabad. After agreeing to meet the demands of the people the Nawab, Mohammedan ruler of the district, arrested leaders of the movement, whereupon rioting broke out. State troops are actively engaged, and people are fleeing towards British territory. The capital of the district is located in the State of Tonk, about fifty miles from Jaipur.

KING GEORGE ON IRELAND.

LONDON, Feb. 15. "Violence will not solve the Irish problem," King George declared to-day in his opening speech from the Throne to the two Houses of Parliament in formally opening the session. "The situation in Ireland still causes me distress. A misguided section of the Irish people persists in resorting to the methods of criminal violence, with the object of establishing an independent republic. Neither Irish unity nor Irish self-government can be obtained by this means," he said. Referring to the coming Near East Conference, in London, His Majesty said: "I earnestly trust that by this means further progress may be made in giving effect to treaties of peace, in establishing concord in Europe, and restoring tranquility in the Near East."
