REV. CANON JOHN MONK NOEL.

Canon Noel, for many years Rector of St. Paul's Church, Harbor Grace, had passed away. For some time the aged cleric had been an invalid and the end was not unexpected—the reverend gentleman having attained the patriarchial age of 80 years.
