Goodridge addressed the meeting on the general objects of the C.L.B. and appealed for the support of the organization by the townfolk generally. The Band supplied some excellent music. Dawe, O.C., thanked him for his kind words and called on the Bay Roberts Company for three cheers for Mr. Russell, which was most enthusiastically given. Mr. Russell is now a J. P. and one of Bay Roberts leading citizens, and the Brigade is proud of one of its old boys.

The National Anthem brought the meeting to a close at 10.15 p.m., after announcing the meeting of a C.L.B. Ladies' Auxiliary to be formed to assist the finances and providing a tea fight for the boys. After the lecture Capt. Dawe entertained the visiting officers to dinner, which made the end of a perfect day. Lieut.-Col. Goodridge and Major Williams were most hospitably entertained at the home of Lieut. Chas. C. and Mrs. Butt, Cable Terrace and returned home Thursday morning, feeling well satisfied that Bay Roberts Company is in good hands and going strong.

### Increase Local Industries.

#### CONFEDERATION NOT AN ISSUE.

It has been advanced by some that Confederation with Canada would afford relief from the present high taxation. While we are not unmindful of the many advantages which would occur to this country through its joining up with the Dominion across the St. Lawrence Gulf, yet we fail to see where an increase of government machinery would in any way lessen the expenses of operation. Under Confederation, besides paying our quota towards the maintenance of the Federal Government, we would have the machinery of a Provincial government also to keep running which would have to be met principally by direct taxation. The one great feature, to our mind, that would reduce the capital taxation, is the establishment of industries that would keep our young people at home, and bring back those who have gone to fields afar. Increasing our population and its earning power and our per capita taxation will increase. Instead of a population of a little over quarter of a million, we should have one of over two and a half millions. If confederation will accomplish this, then the quicker it comes the better, unless it can be accomplished in some other way—Western Star.

### Quintal Not Uniform.

RANGES IN WEIGHT FROM 88 TO 220 POUNDS.  
The following information as to the weights of "quintals" etc., in the different markets (extracted from "Fiskets Ganges") is useful in considering the prices quoted. In Spain the quintal at Bilbao, Santander, Cartagena, and Malaga represents 50 kilograms (equal to 110 1/2 English lbs.) while at Barcelona and Tarragona it represents 40 kilograms, or 88 1/4 lbs., while in Italy it is 100 kilograms, or 220 1/2 lbs. At Havana, in Cuba a whole case is 45 kilograms, or 99 1/4 lbs; this is also the weight at Buenos, but at Rio de Janeiro the case weighs 53 kilograms, or almost 123 lbs.—Trade Review.
