Motorist Fined \$100 for Speeding

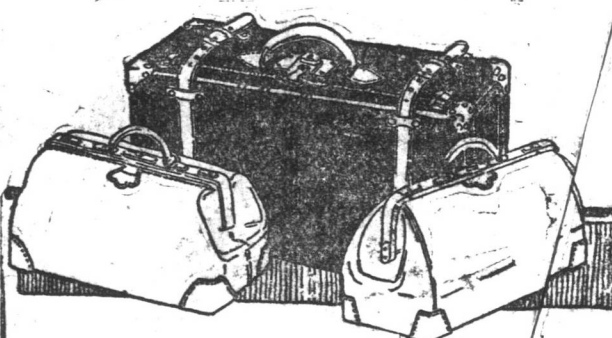

Conroy, with the two men who were in the car, stated they were not going above ordinary speed. Neither would swear that they were going at 20 miles. The accused admitted to a speed of 12 to 15 miles, which is above the speed limit.

Magistrate's Court

JUDGMENT IN BREACH OF CUSTOMS ACT.

Between The Minister of Finance & Customs and James M. Ryan.

This is an action taken upon the complaint of the Minister of Finance & Customs against James M. Ryan, shopkeeper, who is charged with a breach of sections 205 and 206 of the Customs Act, Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series).

Section 205 sets forth—"If any person smuggles or clandestinely introduces into this colony and goods subject to duty or in any way attempts to defraud the revenue by evading the payment of duty on conviction shall be subject to a penalty."

Section 206 enacts—"All goods unloaded or landed before due entry thereof or warrant for entry thereof, shall be seized and forfeited and any persons concerned in landing or receiving or concealing goods so landed shall, on conviction, be subject to a penalty."

The goods, the subject matter of these proceedings, were the property of the defendant purchased and paid for by him in New York. The goods were delivered by the New York firm, from whom Ryan purchased them, to one Perry, a cook on the S. S. Rosalind, and put by him in his room on board the said ship. The goods were not on the ship's manifest and were not comprised in the warrant to unload. The goods were made up in paper parcels and placed in two dirty brin bags and were taken by Perry from his room and handed to Godden, who was in charge of the landing crew, stating the bags contained second hand clothing. Immediately they were landed Godden asked truckman Colin Day to send them to Perry's residence without reporting them.

The goods were not warehoused goods because they were not on the ship's manifest and were not contained in the warrant to unload the ship issued by the Collector on the files of the manifest at the Customs House.

Perry was at Ryan's house on the day the ship arrived and informed Ryan he had the goods in his room on board the S. S. Rosalind. Although Ryan did not actually take part in the landing he was the owner of the goods, Perry being his agent for the time being, and he would have eventually received the goods if Perry had succeeded in getting them away from the ship. If Ryan had not intended to clandestinely introduce the goods through Perry, who was acting for him, he would have immediately reported them to the proper authorities and received the necessary permit for the landing.

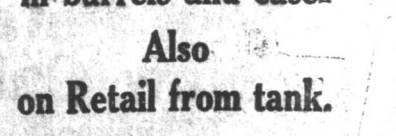
Under the evidence I must convict the defendant of a breach of section 203 of the Customs Act and impose a fine upon him of fifty dollars or in default one month's imprisonment.
