

**Goderich Correspondence.**

The assizes opened here on Monday 21st inst., his Honor Judge Adam Wilson on the bench. There were only three criminal cases, and those of a slight nature—assault and petty larceny. The civil docket was heavy—some 23 cases in all. The court will not be closed this week. Isaac F. Toms has been appointed to finish up the court.

Mr. Page the Government Engineer has been expected since Wednesday, to inspect the damage done by the freshet in the harbour; but as yet he has not put in an appearance. The first arrival on our port was the propeller East, from Kincaid with 13,000 bushels of wheat, which came in on the 19th inst. The William Seymour left on the 17th for Sarnia. The dredges are all at work cleaning out the harbour.

Our fishermen went out on Tuesday for the first time this season, and put out their nets. Yesterday and to-day they brought in the largest take that has been taken for many years, several of the boats being loaded to the gunwale; the fishermen say that there is still immense quantities of loose ice floating in the Lake, and that they experienced a great deal of difficulty in getting out to their nets, as also in returning to the harbour. The fish are nicely bought up, fresh at 5 cents per lb. wholesale. The fishing fleet is not so large as last year.

On Thursday evening the congregation of Knox Church held their annual meeting when the Chairman of the Managing Committee made the pleasing announcement that the congregation was now out of debt and had a small surplus in the Treasury. The salary of the pastor has been raised to \$1,000, being an increase of \$200. Few congregations have struggled more manfully to relieve themselves of debt than this one. It has been over them for the last 14 years, and now they are free.

That pest of our fields, the potato bug, is being dug up in thousands, and wise alarmists are predicting a total failure of the potatoes in consequence. Not exactly a failure, but a total meeting up of the vines, so that none will be the better of the crop but Mr. Colorado Bug.

Owing to the cold weather which has prevailed here for some days past, seeding is progressing slowly. Business in town is dull, and our market almost deserted. If your town has a surplus of butter send it along to us and you will at once be enlisted as public benefactors. The house wife who can secure a few lbs. of this very necessary article for the table becomes at once the object of envy by all her neighbours. It is so scarce that the price is an object. To get possession of it is the question.

A young man in the neighbouring village of Mailandville has just invented and patented a new car-coupler called Campaigne's self car coupler. It has been examined by agents from both the G. T. and G. W. railroads, and by all has been pronounced the simplest and most complete invention yet offered to the public. Dr. Thompson, the American Counsel, is getting a model of it made with a view of sending it to the Vienna Exposition for Exhibition. The advantages of the invention in coupling is that there is nothing to do but back the engine so as to bring up the cars, one to the other, when they couple as soon as they touch each other, therefore, requiring no one near the cars while coupling. A hundred cars may be coupled in the time it now takes to couple one, and there is not the least danger in doing it. The uncoupling is done by means of a wheel or crank fixed in the side of the car so placed so that a person can stand on the ground and do the uncoupling as quick as they can withdraw the bolt of the present coupling. I have seen the invention, and I must say that, in common with many others, I was astonished at its simplicity and fitness for the purpose. Once the cars are coupled there is no possibility of their uncoupling while in motion unless by breaking. The general impression is that young Campaigne has succeeded in getting up a nice thing for himself.
