The Disposition of Wages

In the disposition of the wage returned from the sale of labor power, man is also his own free agent. All things he may lawfully buy he may lawfully abstain from buying. He may purchase from whomsoever he will; he may give his patronage to one man or another. What he may do with his wages in the form of bestowing or withholding his patronage, he may lawfully agree with others to do—Samuel Gompers.

Lashbridge is one of the best industrially organized towns in Western Canada. But politically the wage-workers still elect representatives of the old parties to their law-making.

FISH WASH FACES

PRIOR TO DEATH

Sign of Earthquake or Hurricane, Says Old Sailor

New York, May 27.—A report received by wireless of a fish wash near the Diamond shoals, which was sent in by Captain Johnson of the steamship Morro Castle, is causing much comment among mariners. The slaughter of fish was generally attributed to an earthquake. Later advice stated that some of the fish appeared to have been broken in half by the force of the quake. The story caused South street to gossip and the headquarters of the marine reporters at the Battery was visited by many in search of information.

Captain Acheson, formerly of the good ship Lictograph, which was lost in a West Indian hurricane some years ago, was among the callers.

"Dead fish at sea, as a rule, mean a hurricane or other disaster," said the former skipper. "This Capt. Johnson's report, to have mistaken a school of dead ones for a reef or a shoal, is breaking. Now, there is a reason for that. When fish get a premonition of death they cling closely together. I've seen a whole mile of them in a line, so that they appear to have grabbed one another in a death struggle."

"There is a sure sign of a coming quake at sea. It's when you see a fish washing his face. A fish washes his face in sunshine. He comes up with his face all full of water and turns it up and keeps it up till it dries. Now, why does he wash it dry, when he goes right down into the water again and gets it wet? Ain't it the same with man? He washes his face wetting it, and then dries it off again. I'll bet if that Captain Johnson had washed his face, he would have seen that inside of a few hours every one of them had been washing his face."

Captain Wood, who had sailed the seas longer than Captain Acheson, corroborated the statement that fish wash their faces before any unusual occurrence.

GUIDE HELD FOR CRIME

Accidentally Killed a Woman and

Shot Refuge in Paris—Drugged and Robbed Victims

Paris, May 24.—In the arrest this week of a man who served as a guide for foreigners and made it his business to trap the unwary, the police believe they have caught a murderer for whom the Russian authorities have long been looking. The name by which he went was Markoff, but the Russian records call him Warberg.

He stationed himself here in front of one of the big boulevard hotels which foreigners frequent, and solicited new arrivals to let him show them the night sights as a guide. There are so many men of the same sort around the tourist hotels that while Markoff was so engaged the police paid little attention to him. They could not help noting, however, that he suddenly disappeared not long ago when two Russian detectives arrived. As soon as they had gone he turned up again. This led to an examination of photographs from the Russian office. The police decided that he was the subject of one of them, and arrested him.

According to the Russian account this man and another gave two women in St. Petersburg "knockout drops" and then robbed them. One of the women died. Markoff's companion was arrested, but Markoff sought his self and escaped. He is of diminutive stature, but followed wrestling in his earlier life and still holds his phenomenal strength.

Since placing him under lock, the police have been looking up his Paris relations. They say they have found that he had dealings with certain notorious women, to whom he introduced strangers. American and Englishmen were his favorite dupes, for he knew their dreaded publicity and there was no danger that they would make trouble after being robbed. Robbery was the purpose of the introductions, and it was usually successful. Markoff and his women accomplices made a good livelihood from their victims.

At one time the police undertook to release Markoff on his own recognizance, but they were won by his story of things. They posted notices warning strangers against guides who offered clients life, and even took pains to speak to guests at some of the hotels did not lessen the guides' activities, and they came to the conclusion that foreigners enjoyed the experience of being stripped of their money.
