THE HYAMS TRIAL.

Money to loan at 51 per cent.

Toronto, Nov. 9 .- The entire time yesterday was taken up in cross-examination of Expressman Fox. He corroborated the evidence of previous witnesses as to blood on the hands of Harry Hyams, and as to the position of Wells' body when found in the warehouse. In some instances his evidence was not altogether consonant with that which he gave in the trial at the Spring Assizes. Fox testified that both the Hyams were greatly excited when he arrived at the side of Wells' body, and made repeated inquiries for the cor-oner. He stated that Wells' hands had gloves on, and eye-glasses were in the usual position when found. The whole trend of the evidence for the prosecution is to show that eye-glasses and gloves were placed on Wells after death in order to allay any suspicion which discovery of the body in such a position might arouse.
