TORONTO, Jan. 6.—11 p.m.—An area of
low pressure, which was centered in Dakota
on Saturday, is now moving across the lake
region, and an important high area is
settling in over the Northwest Territories.
Rain has fallen today in Northern Ontario
and in the western portion of the Maritime
Provinces. The weather is very cold in
Manitoba and the Northwest.

An outbreak among the colored children
in the West Jersey, N. J., orphanage has

Broadway and Ann streets, New York, has
been sold by James Gordon Bennett for
nearly \$1,000,000, and will be torn down to
give place to a towering office building.

Santa Cruz, Cal., was visited on Satur-
day by the heaviest rain storm in five
years. The electric light plant was sub-
merged, and the railway bridges rendered
impassable. Great damage was done by
the heavy downpour at Fresno, Cal.

At a largely attended meeting of the
St. Andrew's Society, held in the rooms of
Ald. J. W. Jones, treasurer, on Saturday
evening, it was arranged to hold the
annual celebration of Burns' birthday on or
about the 25th inst. As has been the cus-
tom the affair will take the form of a
grand concert, with all the best local
talent and a humorist from abroad. Last
year's anniversary was phenomenally suc-
cessful. This year promises to be even
more so. It will be the reunion of 1895.

Serious Illness of Mr. Daniel Black.

Mr. Daniel Black, for many years vice-
president of the London Mutual Fire In-
surance Company, is lying at the point of
death at his home on Queen's Avenue East.
Mr. Black was in the best of health on
Dec. 20. On the evening of that day he
went for a walk as was his custom. About
9:30 he was found unconscious on King
street, having suffered a paralytic stroke,
and was taken home in the patrol wagon.
Mr. Black has not regained consciousness
since, and his death is looked upon as a
matter of very few days. The St.
Thomas Journal erroneously reported on
Friday evening that Mr. Black had been
found with a wound on his head, mis-
sion his watch and money, and that he had
died.

How Smallpox is Spread.

It will be recollected that when the de-
struction of the old smallpox hospital in
this city was discussed, the original plan
proposed was to engage a force of men to
tear the structure down, but finally this
scheme was abandoned and it was de-
stroyed by fire. The appalling results
which might have followed the adoption of
the plan of tearing it down are illustrated by
the recent outbreak of smallpox in Detroit
and the spread of the loathsome disease to
St. Thomas, and perhaps other places in
Ontario. Some time ago a portion of the
old smallpox hospital at Detroit was torn
down and rebuilt; on this new portion line
men were engaged in painting. Six of these
men contracted smallpox and everyone of
them died. One of the victims was a man
named Stover, who went to St. Thomas
while the disease was in its incipient stages
and subsequently died in the pest house
there. —[Toronto World.]

THE MIDDLEMARCH MURDER.

Progress of the Preliminary Trial—
Three Witnesses Examined.

ST. THOMAS, Jan. 6.—There were only
three witnesses examined at the prelimi-
nary trial of the Middlemarch murder.
Chas. Welter, uncle of the younger
prisoner, and his wife and Geo. Craig,
their hired man, gave evidence.

Welter and Craig were fully as unstat-
isfactory witnesses as at the inquest, and
nothing new of much importance was
elicited. Neither of them could remember
anything.

As Monday is election day, the court
adjourned till next Tuesday morning.

Two Fatal Railway Wrecks.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—By a collision
with a work train in the Altamont tunnel,
nine miles from Livermore, the Los Angeles
train was wrecked yesterday morning. Its
fireman killed and the engineer pinned by
the wreckage against the boiler and fear-
fully mutilated. He cannot recover.

HAZELTON, Pa., Jan. 6.—A wreck oc-
curred on the Lehigh Valley Railroad at 3
o'clock yesterday morning at Whitehaven.
A driver named Fuller, of Nebraska, was
instantly killed. Charles F. King, another
driver, of Monroe, Pa., was fatally injured,
and brakeman McGinnis was badly hurt.
