Serious Illness of Mr. Daniel Black. Mr. Daniel Black, for many years vicepresident of the London Mutual Fire Insurance Company, is lying at the point of death at his home on Queen's avenue east. Mr. Black was in the best of health on Dec. 26. On the evening of that day he went for a walk as was his custom. About 9:30 he was found unconscious on King street, having suffered a paralytic stroke, and was taken home in the patrol wagon. Mr. Black has not regained consciousness since, and his death is looked upon as a matter of a very few days. The St. Thomas Journal erroneously reported on Friday evening that Mr. Black had been found with a wound on his head, minus his watch and money, and that he had died.

How Smallpox is Spread. It will be recollected that when the destruction of the old smallpox hospital in this city was discussed, the original plan proposed was to engage a force of men to tear the structure down, but finally this scheme was abandoned and it was deoved by fire. The apalling results which might have followed the adoption of the plan of tearing it downare illustrated by the recent outbreak of smallpox in Detroit and the spread of the loathsome disease to St. Thomas, and perhaps other places in Ontario. Some time ago a portion of the old smallpox hospital at Detroit was torn down and rebuilt; on this new portion nine men were engaged in painting. Six of these men contracted smallpex and everyone of them died. One of the victims was a man named Stover, who went to St. Thomas while the disease was in its incipient stages and subsequently died in the pest house there .- [Toronto World.
