VESSEL WRECKED IN A GALE OFF PORT STANLEY HARBOR

Broke Her Cable and Drifted Ashore a Mile Below the Pier-Out of Reach of Help.

Venture Out.

MATE FLOATS ASHORE ON HATCH

Volunteer Crew Organized and the Lifeboat Manned-The Imperiled Sailors Rescued.

Port Stanley, Ont., Oct. 31.-A heavy southwest gale set in here early yesterday morning, which caused so much sea that two coal-laden vessels bound for this port could not make the harbor and came to anchor.

One of them, the Mineral State, of Alpena, Mich., as once set a flag of distress. No assistance could be rendered from shore and at 11 o'clock she either slipped her anchor or the chain broke and she commenced drift-

ing ashore. The Mineral State, which was comloaded with coal for the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway, Port Stanley, soon began breaking up and at noon the mate, George Hazelwood, came ashore on a hatch cover and with the life preserver on. He managed to reach the beach at the foot of the high clay banks, where willing hands soon drew him to safety, and he is no worse for his experience, but was very much exhausted when he reached the shore.
