COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF

ROBERTS NOW UNDER FIRE

British War Office Ways Again Attacked.

"Roberts Ring" Declared Worse Than the Previous Ones.

Dom Paul Skeptical About the Conclusion of Peace—Lays and the Ex-President Confer.

London, May 5.—There are signs of a renewal of expressions of discontent at the war office's methods and the new regulations for volunteers. The latter have caused considerable dissatisfaction, especially as they rendered it impossible for many volunteers to remain in the service.

It was urged that the volunteers must be made a thoroughly efficient body, and must be thoroughly trained in field tactics in open order, and not merely in drill halls and on parade grounds. Lord Stanley, when asked in parliament whether the war office was taking steps to secure open spaces for the London volunteers, who are a large and fine body of men, replied that the cost of securing such places in the immediate vicinity was prohibitive.

It is generally demanded that the volunteers shall have the use of Richmond Park, which is kept up at public expense, and is admirably adapted for these purposes. The members of the cabinet, however, are making the excuse in parliament of the fear of "injuring wild birds, especially herons."

Other people, who are less charitable, suggest that the government is sacrificing the volunteers to the pheasant preservers.

ABUSE OF ROBERTS.
The press is protesting vigorously against this example of refusing the means which it professes to advocate of securing efficiency. The Saturday Review in a savage article under the heading, "The Roberts Ring," declares that things in the army are worse than ever, and influence is now more than ever the only sure road to success. The Review accuses Lord Roberts of pointing the blank of countenancing, if not actively patronizing abuses. It says: "He may sometimes merely acquiesce, but some of the worst abuses of jobs in the army are certainly due to his personal initiative, and the impression thus created is confirmed by many officers who served under him when he

held the Indian command. In a word, his character is conspicuously lacking in fairness."

KRUGER TALKING.
A telegram from The Hague to Neue Wiener Tageblatt is quoted by the Times. It corresponds of the London Times. It says that Paul Kruger, in addressing the Belgian pro-Boer deputation, declared peace would not be concluded without his approval. Kruger added that the English reports representing peace prospects as favorable were mere maneuvers to hoodwink the British people in view of the coronation of King Edward.

A Brussels dispatch to Vienna Neue Presse states that the chairman of the committee of the league of peace has drawn up a project for reconciliation between Great Britain and Boers, which will be submitted to the council of international union at Bern early this month.

The correspondent says these attempts to mislead continental opinion on the part of Boer press agencies in Holland and Belgium, as well as other attempts to revive anglophobia, are fruitless. The great powers are sufficiently occupied with the economic crisis and their own profound dissensions and mutual suspicions.

Dr. Leyds, the Boer representative in Europe, arrived at The Hague Saturday evening and proceeded to Utrecht for a conference with Mr. Kruger.

Peace Near at Hand.

BOERS BELIEVED TO HAVE DECIDED.

There is authority for saying that the Boer leaders to decide for peace, for there is no doubt that they made that decision, was the concession concerning Cape rebels.

These men were liable to death or imprisonment, confiscation of their property and deprivation of their constitutional rights. The extreme punishment that can be meted to them now, according to the promise formerly made by Lord Milner, is confinement and disenfranchisement, which, after all, is not a very serious matter, inasmuch as nine-tenths of them are younger sons of old farmers, who are at home in order to save their property, while the boys, with full parental approval, went into the commandos.

In addition to this concession, informal promises have been given that the banishment proclamation issued by Lord Kitchener will not be rigidly enforced, and that general amnesty will not be unduly delayed.

There has never been any difficulty in regard to rebuilding the farmsteads that have been destroyed and restocking the farms. The general confidence that is felt here in the issue is shown by the fact that the Boers are considering a form of special thanksgiving service for the restoration of peace.

AWFUL CARNAGE AT THE

FALL OF CHING SHANG FU

A Thousand Persons Slain by the Rebels

And Their Bodies Left Unburied in the Streets.

Holocaust in an Egyptian Town—Fifty People Perish—Great Loss of Life Off Japanese Coast.

Victoria, B. C., May 5.—News has been brought by the steamer Olympia from the Orient of further successes by the Kwang Si rebels, whose ever-growing armies were besieging Nanking, on the West River, at last reports. Fugitives who were flying to Canton from the scenes of bloodshed and pillage reported that the slaughter at Ching Shang Fu, when that city fell, was awful. More than 1,000 persons were killed and their bodies left lying unburied in the streets, while the rebels burned and looted the stores and houses. Terrible slaughter is also reported from other captured towns. Several thousand of the imperial army are said to have deserted.
