

DYING HARD, ARE THE LIQUOR MEN

Have Been Looking for Flaws in Reduction Vote, But Fail to Find Any.

The liquor men who are opposing the reduction in the number of licenses are dying hard. They have practically given up hope that the bylaw will be defeated in the council, but they are looking up on the council as to the carrying out of the act for an excuse to have the measure shelved.

Today it was stated that they have been seeking information at the city hall to upset the vote of the people. Some person, whose law, by the way, does not appear to be sound, raised the point that the question had not been submitted to the people in a legal manner, because the word "for" appeared on top of the word "against," whereas the law provides that names shall appear alphabetically on the ballot. The hotelmen argued from this that they had not been fairly treated, as if the word "against" had been first on the ballot it might have secured more notice. The point is certainly a unique one, but it would scarcely convince a court that the hotelmen had been unfairly treated.

However, the consolidated municipal act settles the matter. Section 340 of chapter 223 states that the ballot shall be submitted after a form given, known as Schedule J. This exhibit shows the word "for" on the top line and "against" on the bottom line. And thus the argument ends.

It is probable a deputation of temperance people will wait on the council on Monday night for the purpose of impressing the fact on the city fathers that the temperance people desire the reduction bylaw to be put through at once. No. 3 committee meets tonight, and there is a possibility of that body taking up the temperance proposition and proposing that a bylaw be passed in accordance with the mandate of the people.

LONDON'S POLICE COURT RECORD

Interesting Statistics for Year Past Compiled by Police Department.

Some very interesting statistics have been furnished by Police Chief Williams in regard to police court cases during 1905. Each of the 1,759 cases have to be classified into their different charges, the number of each sex ascertained, the convictions, withdrawals, discharges and nationalities all set down.

Notwithstanding the substantial increase in population in the city, the number of convictions during 1905 total 44 less than that of 1904. One hundred and twenty-five more cases were proceeded with in 1905, but there being a considerably larger number charged. The drunk and disorderly class far outstrip all the others in number in this class than 1904. Last year there were 232 males and 12 females convicted on this charge, as against 229 males and 23 females for the year before.

An interesting feature of the statistics is that but 36 females were convicted of offences during 1905 as against 57 the previous year. The list of convictions are as follows:

NO SMALLPOX IN THIS VICINITY

Health Officer Hutchinson Says No Cause for Alarm—Some Chickenpox.

A smallpox scare for which there is, Medical Health Officer Hutchinson says, absolutely no foundation, was almost worked up around the city hall this morning.

The cause of the scare was the information which leaked out that a certain prominent local physician had asked Dr. Hutchinson to examine a patient who has been under treatment some time for chickenpox.

The practitioner was not quite sure as to the nature of the disease, and fearing that it might be smallpox he called in the medical health officer, who is an authority on the disease.

To The Advertiser, Dr. Hutchinson stated that there is absolutely no cause for alarm as there is not a case of smallpox in London. The doctor added that he examined persons every week who are suffering from chickenpox for fear that their physicians might be mistaken in the nature of the disease. At present there are quite a number of cases of chickenpox in the city, but there is nothing in the nature of an epidemic.

Dr. Hutchinson also stated today that Charles Ballantyne, the unfortunate young man who came from Chicago to London some time ago, and is dying of consumption, is now suffering from gangrene. The disease has almost amputated one leg and the doctors are thinking of performing an operation to prolong his life, though this at best will be but brief.

DID NOT ESCAPE EYE OF SLEUTHS

Thief Attempted to Hide Stolen Stuff Under Overcoat, But Was Spotted.

When Detectives Nickle and Egeiton were doing their beat this morning they ran across John Watson, alias Walker, who was carrying his overcoat over his arm.

The officers noticed that Watson appeared to be hiding something, and on taking him in on suspicion, they found 30 or 25 pounds of brass fixtures for engines on him.

Watson said that his home was in Ingersoll, and that he had just come from there. He bought the brass, he declared, from a man in Ingersoll. On further questioning, however, he admitted that he stole the stuff from White & Sons' engine works last night. It appears that he is taking off a number of valves from the engines in the yard of the above-named firm. The value of the brass is not so great, but the damage done is considerable.

SAW COMPANIES MERGE

Simonds Company of New York Takes Over Big Canadian Concern.

New York, Jan. 10.—Announcement was made today that the Simonds Manufacturing Company, saw and knife makers, with factories at Pittsburg, Mass., and Chicago, Ill., has taken over the business of the Canada Saw Company, of Montreal, St. John, Ottawa and Toronto. The new company will be known as the Simonds-Canada Saw Company, and will be operated under the Canada Company's charter in Canada. More than \$250,000 is involved in the merger.

AN UNWELCOME VISITOR

License Inspector Drops Into Dancing Hall and Sees Things.

License Inspector A. R. Galpin, an uninvited caller at John Coursey's dancing-hall last Thursday evening, and not only an uninvited one, but a most unwelcome one.

Coursey is a colored man who is the proprietor of a dancing-hall patronized by both white and colored persons. But Inspector Galpin called in his official capacity. The inspector found some of the guests in an intoxicated condition. It is said, and this morning he placed a charge against Coursey charging him with selling liquor without a license.

The case was adjourned until Monday next by consent of both parties. The inspector alleges that he found liquor being passed around freely among the guests.

DARCH CHAIRMAN A SECOND YEAR

Will Again Preside Over the Water Commission—No Surplus for the City.

Chairman Darch, of the water commission, is likely to be re-elected at the meeting of the commission, which will be held on Monday next. To The Advertiser today he stated that it is quite true that the commissioners will have no money to hand over to the city council this year. He states that in accordance with the law provision must be made out of the year's revenue for the Saulty judgment, and this item alone will prove no inconsiderable one. He points out, too, that the city has not the power to issue debentures to cover such an item and that it must come out of the current revenue.

Then he says that quite a large amount of money will have to be spent on capital account to meet the requirements of water users, and on the whole he can see no surplus to hand over to the city council to spend. What Mayor Judd's position on this matter will be is not quite plain. He is an ex-officio member of the commission, and, of course, the aldermen will expect him to do his best to get the money possible for the commonsense. Thus he will be between two fires.

The commissioners this year are expected to secure something out of the theater at Springbank. It comes under the control of the commission in May next, and already an offer has been made for it. In the past the theater has proven a white elephant, but last summer it is said to have made money. The company which has made the offer for the theater is asking for improvements, and the commissioners may not care to make them. Then it is proposed to build a theater, and this proposition will have to meet the disapprobation of the public, who will not care to see a closed theater in a public park.
