

SISTER TRACES LONG LOST BROTHER

For Twenty-Six Years William
Betteridge Was Lost in
North America.

FOUND AT HAMILTON

Affectionate and Emotional Scene
When Separated Ones Had
First Meeting.

Hamilton, April 4. — Lost for 26 years to his widowed mother and sister, Wm. Betteridge, 156 Gibson avenue, was located here after a search that lasted all these years and extended over thousands of miles of land and sea. At 8 years of age he left his home in Birmingham, England, because he thought if he remained he would be a burden to his widowed mother. Bravely he started for America, the land of opportunity. Before leaving he took what he supposed was his farewell look at his baby, sister, Laura, then only 2 years old. It was this sister who persistently kept up the search, which finally resulted in his being located in Hamilton. They had an affectionate meeting on Tuesday, March 25, when the sister, now a married woman, came here with her husband from Sayre, Pa.

For a long time after the little chap came to America, his mother received letters, but finally they ceased, until the boy's mother gave him up as lost in this great country.

Sister Starts Hunt.

Her daughter grew to womanhood, and finally, five years ago, decided to come to America with a party of friends who had decided that this country offered better opportunities than England. When she was leaving home, her mother asked her to look up her brother Willie. The mother did not realize the expanse of America; this country seemed to her like little old England. Laura came to America, and three years ago she was married to Frank Karkuff, of the Lehigh Valley Railroad. She told her husband that she was asked by her mother to find her brother, so they commenced what proved to be a successful effort to find him.

The last his mother had heard of him whereabouts was in a letter received from Canada. Mr. and Mrs. Karkuff commenced writing letters to the postmasters of different towns of Canada. Letter after letter was sent, but without success. Finally the postmaster at Simcoe, Ont., replied that a man named Cropp, a foreman in a manufacturing plant, remembered that years before he had an apprentice named Betteridge. He was under the impression that the apprentice had gone to another Canadian town. From the information imparted by Cropp the child who had left home 26 years ago was finally found to be a man residing here.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Karkuff left Sayre Monday afternoon, March 25, on Lehigh train No. 1. At three o'clock Tuesday morning they entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Betteridge. The meeting was past the powers of description. When he realized that he was clasping in his arms his sister whom he had only seen when she was two years of age, he was overcome by emotion. Her quest having been accomplished, she also gave vent to her emotions and she was long before he could introduce her to his wife and she could introduce him to her husband. Yesterday the brother and sister parted, and she and her husband returned to Sayre. But the brother and sister have arranged for many meetings in the future, for they are not far apart, Atlantic waters no longer roll between.

Over in the old country a widowed mother and four sons will hear the glad tidings as rapidly as the mail can carry them.

"WINNIE" LATHWELL HAS BEEN PARDONED

Governor Dix Sets Canadian
Life Prisoner Free.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., April 4.—Word has been received here to the effect that Governor John A. Dix has signed a pardon for Albert "Winnie" Lathwell, who murdered his wife, nearly killed another woman and almost fatally injured himself.

The crime was committed fourteen years ago, and Lathwell was sentenced to life imprisonment in Auburn Prison in 1898. There are many here who remember the crime, but none who recall the circumstances, and who will be more rejoiced at receiving the news of the pending release of the man than his family, who live at Orangeville, Ont., where Lathwell, who is now a man 37 years old, has a father and several brothers and sisters, all of whom are now looking forward to the release of their son and brother.

Lathwell, who is a barber by trade, came here and opened a shop, his wife maintaining a neatly-furnished apartment above the shop, and they seemed happy until a woman who had known Lathwell in the west came, and in some way managed to secure a foothold in the home. She was of the underworld, and finally succeeded in enticing the young wife to leave her home, and the pair went to Buffalo.

They were traced to Buffalo by the husband and induced to return. Things did not go well, and one day, after working all day, Lathwell returned to his apartment and found that things had not been as they should. He went out, bought a revolver and a bottle of laudanum and went back to the house. He told the two women that things would have to cease, and when they both laughed at him he opened fire. At the first shot his wife fell mortally wounded. He then fired two shots at the other woman, and she fell. He took the

The young man's father (Lathwell was then but 23 years old) wanted to at once endeavor to secure his pardon after he had been sent to prison, but the son would not permit a step to be taken until after he had served ten years. The proceedings which on Monday resulted in the governor signing the pardon were started two years ago, and will not be finally concluded with the release of the man until April 25, when the state board of pardons passes on the action of the governor. Lathwell is expected to proceed at once to the home of his father in Orangeville, Ont.
