BRYAN SPRINGS A SENSATION ON DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

Puts Forward and Carries Resolution Declaring War on the Trusts and Reactionaries—Wanted Ryan and Belmont To Resign as Delegates.

Baltimore, June 27.—The sensation of the Democratic national convention came at tonight's session, when William J. Bryan offered a resolution calling for the withdrawal of Thomas F. Ryan and August Belmont from the convention. Mr. Ryan is a member of the Virginia delegation and August Belmont occupies a seat in New York's delegation. Both Ryan and Belmont were in the hall when the resolution was presented. It caused a tremendous uproar, and precipitated one of the most disorderly scenes witnessed in the convention hall since the Democrats gathered at Baltimore.

Bryan challenged the New York and Virginia delegations each to put the question to a vote, and offered to abide by the result. New York State ignored his challenge, and Mr. Ryan offered to withdraw from the Virginia delegation. His Virginia fellow-delegates refused to accept his offer, and assured him that they would combat the Ryan insult.

Bryan Better. After speeches in which Bryan bitterly assailed both Ryan and Belmont, to their faces, and was answered in turn by equally forceful thrusts from members of the Virginia and other delegations, he withdrew the part of his resolution which called for the purging of the convention of Ryan and Belmont.

Mr. Bryan withdrew this part of his resolution on the ground that the states objected to interference with their prerogatives by the national convention. The part of the resolution that was left declared that the Democratic party was opposed to the nomination of any candidate for president who is a representative of trusts and reactionaries. It was under this part of the resolution that J. Pierpont Morgan, Thomas F. Ryan, August Belmont, or any other of the privilege-hunting or favor-seeking class.

This extraordinary resolution was passed by the convention late tonight by a vote of 899 to 180. It required a two-thirds vote, or 725, to put the resolution through.

Common Sense Strength. By the vote tonight, Mr. Bryan has again demonstrated his strength in the Democratic convention. He considers it a vindication of his stand against the selection of Alton B. Parker as temporary chairman. He contends that the same issues were involved in this contest as were presented in the former one. Apparently, however, there is no marked significance as between the candidates in tonight's vote. New York State's delegation, for instance, including August Belmont, voted for what was left of the Bryan resolution, and the Virginia delegation's votes, with the exception of one-half a vote, also were cast in favor of it. Many of the delegates that voted against the resolution at first changed their votes after it was apparent that it would go through.

Bryan seemed to regard the passage of his resolution as the turning point in his fight against the so-called reactionaries. His face beamed as delegation after delegation fell in line for the measure.

At the conclusion of the roll call Bryan had the following to say in regard thereto:

"This vote eliminates all of the reactionaries and we can now proceed to the election of a progressive, put him on a progressive platform and go out and win. There are some things which I think it would be wise for the candidate to do, but they need not be announced until his nomination."

Baltimore, Md., July 27.—It was 11 o'clock before the nominating speeches of the Democratic National convention began. The leaders themselves acknowledged that they had no idea what the outcome would be. The situation was chaotic, and Bryan's attack on Ryan and Belmont had added to the confusion. It was known, however, that New York's votes were to go to Harmon on the first ballot, and to Champ Clark on the second. Mayor Gaynor received only two votes in the New York State delegation caucus.

The throwing of New York's votes to Clark was part of an understanding with Charles F. Murphy, by which Clark delivered a sufficient number of votes to insure the election of Judge Parker as temporary chairman.

As the nominating speeches began Clark and Wilson were clearly the most promising candidates, with John W. Kern, of Indiana, a possibility in event of a deadlock, and with a shadow of Bryan, himself, hanging over the convention. The conservatives in the convention were prepared

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MONTREAL SHOWS LARGEST GAIN

Population Increased 355,480 Within the Last Forty Years.

THE QUEEN CITY SECOND

Males Increased in Forty Years 2,056,756, and the Females 1,662,321.

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, June 27.—Some additional details respecting the census are set forth in a blue book just issued.

The largest gain in the period of 40 years was made by Montreal, being 355,480; the second largest by Toronto, being 317,538; the third largest, by Winnipeg, being 135,794. Vancouver's growth was 100,401 in less than thirty years.

Males totaled 3,821,067, and females 2,883,771; males, single, numbered 369,160, and females, single, 1,941,574; males married, were 1,231,564, and females, married, 1,251,182; widowers totaled 89,121 and widows 179,598. Divorces numbered 1,530. Comparing the four first census by percentages of population in 1871 and 1911, males increased during the 40 years by 2,056,756, and females by 1,662,321; single males by 1,185,373 and single females by 848,128; married males by 738,527 and married females by 708,843; widowed males by 51,624 and widowed females by 99,703.

The number of occupied dwellings in the sub-divisions of the Dominion in 1911 was 1,419,912, and the number of families 1,488,353, compared with 1,028,892 dwellings and 1,070,747 families in 1901. The average number of persons per dwelling in 1911 was 2.696, and per family 4.841, compared with averages of 2.220 per dwelling, and 4.616 per family in 1901.

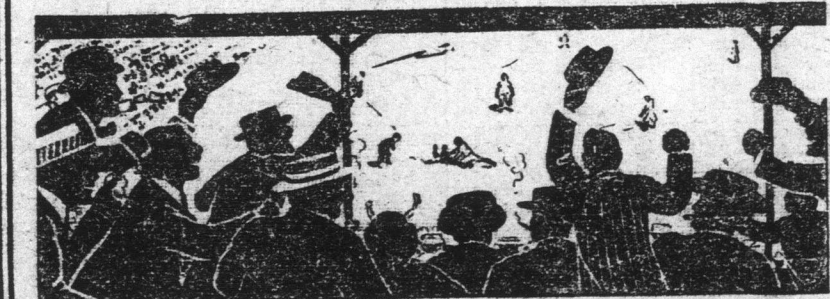
