Wounded in Great Numbers Arrive Daily in Berlin

LONDON, Sept. 3.—7:10 p.m.—A dispatch to the Evening News from Copenhagen says: "Great numbers of wounded are arriving in Berlin daily. The trains are not unloaded until dark, in order to avoid undue curiosity on the part of the public. The wounded are coming mostly from East Prussia. Princess Louise of Belgium has been ordered to leave Vienna within 24 hours."

GERMAN RIGHT WING MAY BE CAUGHT BETWEEN FIRES

Has Advanced Too Far—Allies' Centre Resting Well, With Right On Offensive—Bloody Combat at La Fere.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—3:01 p.m.—An undated French dispatch to the Times says: "The Valley of the Somme has been abandoned. La Fere has been taken after a bloody combat. We were obliged to retire Saturday evening."
"The right wing of the Germans," says the correspondent, "is too far advanced and there is a chance that it will be cut and caught between two fires if the British should be found in force. Our centre is resting very well and the right wing of our army appears to be taking the offensive."

CLASH BETWEEN ARMENIANS AND TURKS AT BEITLESS

PETROGRAD (St. Petersburg), via London, Sept. 3.—4:52 p.m.—The Turkish mobilization on the Persian boundary is slow. Many Christians and Kurds have refused to join the movement. The Turks are forcibly enrolling all persons of military age. There has been a serious conflict between Turks and Armenians at Beitless in Turkish Armenia.

KAISER WANTS SWEDEN'S AID

LONDON, Sept. 3.—8:10 p.m.—Telegraphing from Stockholm the correspondent of the Star says: "There is great anxiety felt in the Swedish capital, because of the efforts Germany is making as shown by articles in the German newspapers to induce Sweden to abandon her attitude of neutrality and take the field as an ally of Germany. The object sought is to weaken the Russian attack in East Prussia by means of a Swedish attack on Finland."
A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Amiens says that the success of the Germans at Morville made the capture of Amiens certain. The entry was not contested. The mayor, after receiving a German envoy, announced the surrender of the city and urged the citizens to make no disturbance.

CABLE CUT AT TSING TAU

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—The Commercial Cable Company tonight issued a statement saying that it had been advised by the Chinese Telegraph Company that communication with Tsing Tau, the German base in Kiao Chow, is totally interrupted.

ALLIES READY TO KEEP ENEMY FROM OFFENSIVE

PARIS, Sept. 3.—11:45 a.m.—In an official statement, issued today, the War Office says: "There has been no contact with the German forces in the region of Compiègne and Senlis since yesterday. Precautions have been taken to stop any offensive movement of the army."
"Measures have also been taken to provide for the pursuit of the German aeroplanes, particularly those of the armored type, which will be prevented from flying over Paris."
The situation in the northeast is the same as yesterday."

ANNOYERS OF PARIS BROUGHT TO EARTH

Two German Aeroplanes Meet Fate and Occupants Killed.

GERMAN AVIATOR VIOLATES NEUTRALITY

BELFORT, France, Sept. 2.—Via Paris, Sept. 3.—3:53 p.m.—A German aeroplane last night dropped several shells here. The missiles made much noise, but did no damage. The aviator, to avoid the fire of the Belfort forts, made a detour over Swiss territory. Also he came from the south instead of coming directly from Alsace, and it is declared here that this act apparently constitutes a violation of the neutrality of Switzerland.

AUSTRALIA SENDING MORE VOLUNTEERS

London, Sept. 4.—In addition to the first expedition, Australia has arranged to send to England more infantry and light horse.

Pope Will Announce His Program Tuesday

ROME, Sept. 3.—The new pope has decided to hold his first consistory next Tuesday when he will confer the Red Hat on Cardinal Anthony Mendes Dello, patriarch of Lisbon, and Cardinal Guiseppe Menendez, archbishop of Toledo, Spain. Both were created cardinals by Pope Pius X. at the consistory last May.
The pope will deliver on Tuesday his first allocution, which will give to the world the program of his pontificate.
One of the brothers of the pontiff is an admiral in the Royal Italian navy, and another is a captain in the Italian navy. The first appointment by the pope was that of Monsignor Parolin, nephew of Pope Pius X., to be canon of St. Peter's.

CORRESPONDENTS IN THE WAR ZONE ALL UNDER ARREST

Newspapermen Forced To Abandon Work With Armies—Richard Harding Davis Caught Four Times.

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—Richard Harding Davis cables to the Tribune, from London, as follows: "This war has seen the end of war correspondents. Of several, that came near being true in every sense of the word. The trouble was that, unable to obtain credentials, they tried without them to see the fighting, and in consequence were arrested."

"No prejudice or favoritism was shown. Every army in turn arrested every correspondent. I was arrested by the Belgians, the French, the Germans and even by the Dutch. But by the time we reached Holland I was so sick for sleep that all I remember of that journey is Gerald Morgan dragging me out of the railroad carriage, handing me my tickets and shaking me into wakefulness. When we reached the gangplank of the English boat at Flushing, he exclaimed, 'Thank God, we are now free from arrest.' I asked, 'Have you been arrested?' For two days, said Gerald, 'You were taken across Holland by that gentleman who carried your valise.' The American correspondent who first scored an arrest was Capt. Grandville Fortescue, of Washington, and who, during President Roosevelt's administration was military aide at the White House. He was the first man to see any fighting and get his story back to New York."

"With the Belgian army he was very popular, and banking on this, when the French arrived at Namur, Capt. Fortescue walked to meet the French general, saying genially to him, 'Welcome to our city.' To this the French general answered: 'Who the devil are you?' and not being satisfied with Fortescue's reply, the general, in accordance with the rules that the French War Office has laid down, ordered him to Paris under arrest."
"Fortescue protested in vain. He finally was taken to Paris, and led before the chief of police, who said a mistake had been made and offered to give Fortescue an ample apology. Fortescue returned to London."

Arrested By Germans.
"On August 17, four more American correspondents fell into the advancing tidal wave of Germans. They were John T. McCutcheon, the cartoonist, the genial Irvin Cobb, a rival humorist representing the Saturday Evening Post, Will Irwin, of Collier's Weekly, and Arno Dorsch, a Socialist, of Harvard, representing World's Work. They had gone to Louvain, and were arrested by the Germans. They explained that they were American correspondents who had lost touch with their respective papers. But, said the German officer, 'correspondents are not permitted with the German army.' 'We know that,' said Cobb, 'but here we are. What are you going to do about it?'"

Kept in a Hotel.
"The German officer answered by placing them under detention in their hotel, in which for four days they sat around playing dominoes and watching miserable Belgian citizens led past them on their way to execution. They were dismayed by this they set forth on August 22, their numbers increased by the presence of John O'Connell Bennett, the Chicago Tribune's former editor, and Harry Hanson, of the Chicago News, Lewis, of the Associated Press, and Maurice Gerbault, of the Chicago Daily News. Irwin and Dorsch next day returned to Brussels, bringing word that Gerbault had been taken by the Germans as a suspected spy, chiefly on account of his nationality, and also because, against all our warnings, he would insist on taking photographs, which by every army in this war is forbidden."
"When I left Brussels these correspondents had completely disappeared. Until this morning, when a telegram arrived from Hanson, dated from Brussels. The others are probably with him, but wherever they may be they are safe."

ITALIAN SOCIALISTS FAVOR THE ALLIES

Distinctly Show German Delegation Why They Cannot Sympathize With the Kaiser's Cause.

London, Sept. 4.—A Rome dispatch to the Times says that the German Socialists, who came to Rome to explain to the Italian Socialists their attitude regarding the present war, were received in a lukewarm manner. "The Rome Socialists adopted a motion protesting against the delegation, whose mission they consider an insidious intrigue. The motion says: 'We hope peace shall be soon restored without conquests or conquests. If this hope be defeated, then let the war end in a victory for France, where real Socialism prevails, and for England, where a mock social Liberalism flourishes.'"
Della Seta, a prominent Socialist, says the Times dispatch, replied to the address of the German delegation as follows: "The German motto is 'Germany above all,' and German Socialism has failed to oppose it. Socialism must wage a war against what represents the most terrible backward step in civilization, namely, the violation of the neutrality of Belgium, against which German Socialists failed to protest. After peace we shall convene the international congress."

HOLLAND WILL KEEP ALL HER RICE FLOUR
