

Antwerp Has Fallen Into the Hands of Germans
 Boston Takes Second; Shutting Out the Athletics

BELGIANS LEFT ANTWERP AFTER SIEGE OF TEN DAYS AND BLEW UP SOME FORTS

Friday Afternoon White Flag Was Run Up On Cathedral as Sign of Surrender—Reports Contradictory as to Cathedral Being Damaged.

 London, Oct. 10.—12:18 a.m.—The British war office announces that Antwerp was evacuated by the Belgians yesterday.

 London, Oct. 10.—5:10 a.m.—An official message from Berlin states that Antwerp has fallen, according to a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam.
 TAKEN IN FORENOON.
 (Canadian Press.)
 London, Oct. 10.—11:32 a.m.—The official announcement of the fall of Antwerp, given out at German general headquarters late last night, and transmitted here via Marconi wireless, says: "This forenoon several forts of the inner line of the fortifications of Antwerp have fallen. The town since midday has been in our possession."
 "The commander and the garrison evacuated the fortifications. Only a few forts are still occupied by the enemy, and this is without influence on our position in Antwerp."

OFFICER CONFIRMS.
 Amsterdam, via London, Oct. 10.—4:40 a.m.—According to the Rotterdam correspondent of the Handelsblad, the Germans entered Antwerp through the suburb of Berchem. The correspondent received the news from an officer, who transported wounded soldiers to the Holland town.

TOOK TEN DAYS.
 The siege of Antwerp, which culminated in its fall on Friday, October 9, according to the official announcement by the German general headquarters, began on September 29, so that the Germans took just ten days to reduce the formidable fortifications which surrounded the temporary capital of the Belgians. The Germans had, however, for a long time previously been attacking the city from the north, and the attack on Antwerp by taking a number of towns in its vicinity.

BOMBARDING GERMANS.
 Antwerp, Oct. 9, noon, via London, Oct. 10.—6:10 a.m.—The inner circle of forts has been blown up by the Germans, who are now entrenched in the village of Contich. The stream of fugitives continues without a break. Many people spent an entire night in coal cars. Thousands of peasants, who never before had left home, are afraid to cross into Holland, and spend the night in the streets of Dutch soldiers are distributing milk and bread and water, and have been ordered to give the famished thousands all possible help.

RUSSIANS BEATEN ON THE OFFENSIVE
 PORTUGAL LIKELY TO DECLARE WAR

 At the Front at Wirballen, Russian Poland, Oct. 7, via The Hague and London, Oct. 10, 7 a.m.—The Russians finally have decided to take the offensive. The Germans heretofore have often complained that the Czar's troops, though twice stronger numerically, refused to leave their trenches, but for the last three nights the Russians have attacked along the entire front, extending 60 miles, from about Wilkowysk, north of Augustowo, to the point below Loeck. East Prussia. The attacks were repulsed, however, the Russians losing heavily, while the German losses were light.

ALLIES DRIVE GERMANS OUT OF POSITIONS

Worked Immense Destruction On Enemy Near the Village of Loison.

CHECKED ALL ADVANCES
 Around Lille Kaiser's Troops Have Been Completely Routed.

DRIVEN BACK 13 MILES
 Have Evacuated the District and Great Ring Is Broken Up.

London, Oct. 10.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail in France, under date of Thursday at noon, in describing the battle at Lille, which has reached its fifth day, says: "Yesterday the French force, firing over Lens at the German position near the village of Loison, wrought immense destruction, and the German advance from the northeast has received an effective check, the Germans, according to the latest information, retreating about eight miles."

"The battle began Sunday, when the Germans made a desperate attempt to escape the encircling movement of the allies' left wing. A violent series of engagements occurred Sunday afternoon between some 10,000 Germans and the French infantry occupying the town of Lille and its surroundings. Savage fighting was continued in the streets and suburbs until Monday morning, when the enemy was finally repulsed.

Terrible Havoc.
 "On Tuesday a fight occurred between the French and a big army stretched along the whole eastern, northern and northwestern suburbs of Lille. The battle raged all day long, and well into the night, and the French guns wrought terrible havoc. The German infantry fire was ineffective, and the battle ended with the complete rout of the enemy, and the German army at Arrmentieres, which had been intended to cover the flank of the main body advancing on Lille and Arras, was driven back thirteen miles.

Again Beaten.
 "The following day the Germans gradually retired east and north, and today I hear they have been driven back to the northeast of Lens, with heavy losses.

"Late tonight news comes that they have completely evacuated the Lille district, that the great Lille ring is a ring no longer, and that all that is left of the ring is two wavering lines, one pointing northeast and the other southwest. Lille stands between, unhurt."

'HOLD-UP' MINISTER VIOLENT ATTACKS ELUDES OFFICERS ARE ALL REPULSED

Leaves Dundas Street Residence Before Immigration Officials Arrive.
 GOES WITH HIS FATHER
 Supposed To Have Left For Bolton, Ont.—Deportation Threatened.

 Paris, Oct. 10.—3:11 p.m.—The following official announcement was given out in Paris this afternoon:
 "The fighting continues under satisfactory conditions. Our entire battle front has been maintained in spite of violent attacks of the enemy at several points.

"On our left wing, in the region included between Labasse, Armentieres and Cassel, there has been fighting between the opposing forces of cavalry. To the north of the Oise our troops have attained real advantages at several places in their zone of activity. In the region of St. Mihiel we have made material progress.

"As to Belgium, it is announced that Warsaw was taken yesterday. The conditions under which this place was occupied by the enemy are, however, not yet known.

"In Russia very spirited fighting continued on the front of East Prussia, where the Russians have had partial successes. They have occupied the town of Lyck (in East Prussia).
 "The fighting of Przemyel continues under conditions favorable for the Russians, who have taken by assault one of the forts of the main line of defence."

While immigration officers were on their way this morning to the house at 769 Dundas street, where Rev. J. N. Wilson, of Milan, Mich., who confessed "fakery" to the story that he was robbed of \$4,500, and then knifed by thugs on Wednesday night, was staying, Wilson disappeared, and has not been heard from by the police since.

He is said to have gone to Bolton, Ont., where his father resides. Had Wilson been apprehended by the officers it is stated that arrangements would have been made for his deportation from the country.

BOSTON INCREASES LEAD BY WINNING THE SECOND GAME

Big James Repeats Rudolph's Victory and Gives the Braves Two-Game Lead in Race For the World's Honors.

 Shibe Park, Philadelphia, Oct. 10.—The Boston Braves, National League pennant winners, victorious in the opening engagement of the world's series campaign of 1914, gave battle to the Philadelphia Athletics, twenty thousand persons viewed the fray and cheered the American League champions in their efforts to turn the fortunes of battle in their favor, and thereby place the two contenders for the season's baseball honors on even terms.

Today's game was almost crucial for the Athletics. A defeat meant that Boston would open their two-day home stay in Fenway Park on Monday with only two more victories needed to clinch the big title in baseball, while the Athletics would be forced to struggle desperately to take four full games and claim the world's series. The game was even to day on the outcome of the series.
