## DISCREPANCIES FOUND FORMER FINANCE BY POLICE IN HARRIS' MURDER CONFESSION

New York Detectives Will Give Alleged Slayer Thorough Gruelling.

LONDON AS ADDRESS

Pair Are Traced by Woman's Bright Green Hat.

Buffalo, April 7 .- Although Roy Har ris, alias Geb Leonard, had not devi-ated from the original story of his alleged part in the murder last June of Joseph B. Elwell, wealthy New York clubman, the police here today, after a careful analysis of his signed confession, pointed to certain discrepancies be-tween it and known facts that gave rise skepticism as to its truthfulness.

Harris fixes the time of the shooting of Elwell at shortly after 3 o'clock in the morning. He also says that his alleged pal, Bill Dunkin, used a smallcalibre revolver. Elwell's death wound was inflicted by a bullet of large calibre, and the wound was of such a nature that it is doubtful that he could have lived from the hour mentioned by Harris until 8:30 a.m., when he was found by his housekeeper unconscious but still alive. Harris also fixed the date of the murder as June 12, whereas it occurred on the morning of June 11.

Harris reiterated today the claim that he has not seen his alleged pal, Dunkin, nor the woman, known to him as Mrs. Fairchild, who is alleged to have hired the pair to slay Elwell, since he re-ceived a partial payment of the \$5,000 which they were to receive for committing the murder. Harris was arrested last night on a charge of passing a forged check for \$79 at St. Catharines, Ont. He had been living at a hotel here since Monday with his wife.

He had left the hotel several minutes before, the clerk told the police. One of the bellboys told of a bright green hat worn by the woman with him, and it was through this that the police were able to locate the couple in Main street. No material damage was done. a few moments later. At the police sta-tion, the detectives say, Harris seemed to be ill at ease and Detective Flynn, who made the arrest, asked him to "come clean." Harris is alleged to have first denied there was anything else to tell, but Flynn asked him 'how about New York?" The start it gave the prisoner showed the sleuths they were on the right track.
