It is regrettable that the incident should have occurred at the close of the most successful season ever enjoyed by soccer in this district. However, something is wrong somewhere, and these things have a habit of coming to light sooner or later. The matter will be aired before the O. F. S. and the hope is that there will establish the source of the muddle.
