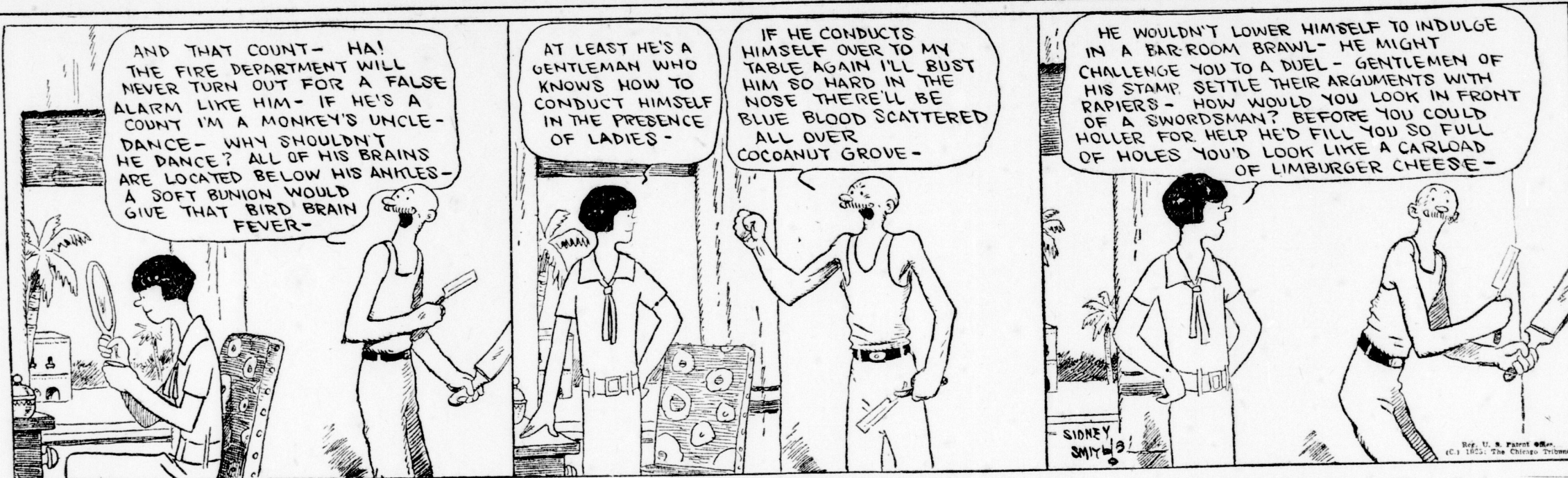
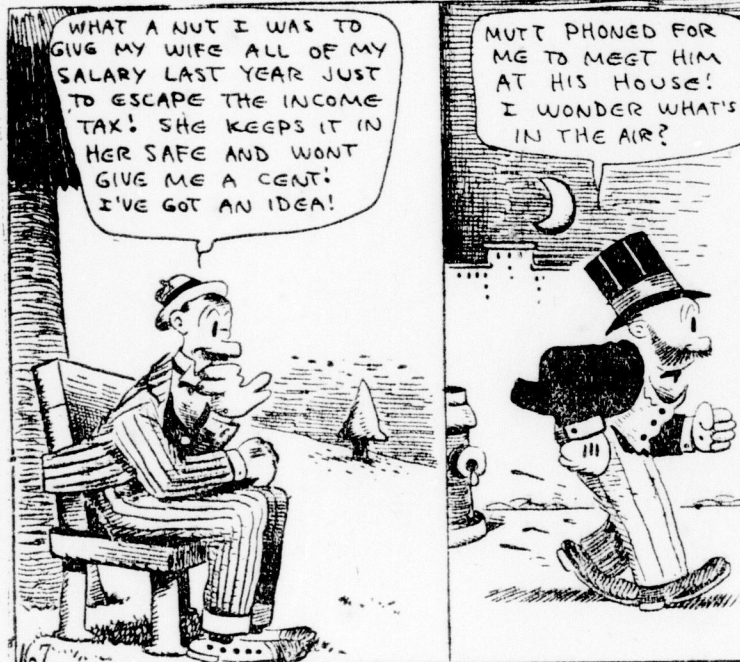

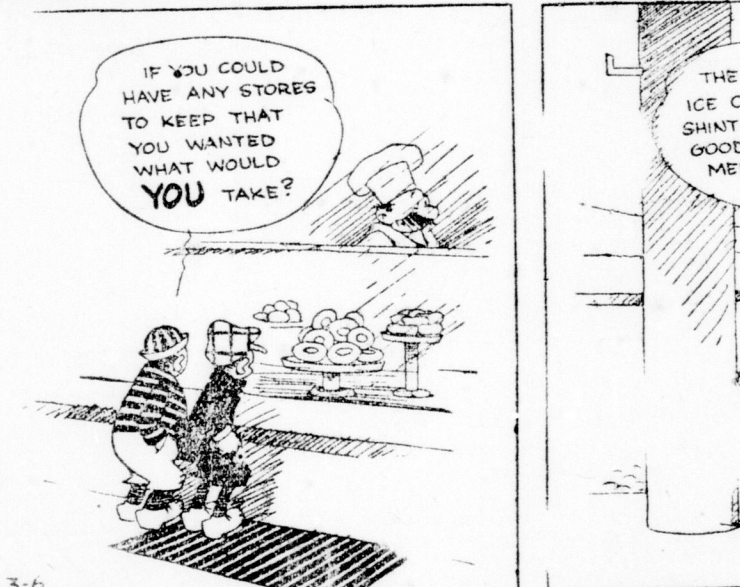

PROVINCE DELAYS ACTION ON UNION

Nickle Tells Committee Another Church Bill Expected Next Week.

Toronto, March 5.—Hon. W. F. Nickle advised the private bills committee at the legislature this morning that he understood there would be another church union bill presented to the house and thought that the committee should consider both bills at the same time. He suggested next Tuesday or Wednesday as suitable days to consider the bill.

However, as non-concurring bill has not yet been presented to the house it may not be possible to have before the private bills committee next week. The discussion will probably be held over until the week after next.

SPEECH OVER 3 HOURS CUTS RECORD IN N. HOUSE

Halifax, N. S., March 5.—Dr. B. A. Leblanc, Conservative member for Richmond, broke the record for long speeches at the present session of the Nova Scotia legislature, when he held the floor for over three hours yesterday afternoon and evening, devoting the greater part of his speech to a denunciation of the government's treatment of the labor situation in the coal and steel industries and stressing the importance and necessity for an independent audit of the provincial finances.

AMOS IS ELECTED HEAD OF COUNCIL

Palmerston Man Named President of Agriculture Body—Go To Ottawa.

Toronto, March 5.—W. A. Amos, Palmerston, Ont., president of the United Farmers of Ontario, was re-elected president of the council of agriculture at the evening session, and George Edwards of Markham, Sask., was elected vice-president. Those elected to the executive committee were C. Rice-Jones, Winnipeg; J. A. Mahan, Regina; A. J. M. Poole, Kelowna, Man.; H. E. G. Scholte, field, Crossfield, Alb., and G. F. Chipman, Winnipeg.

The women's section reaffirmed their stand on the question of egg grading, favoring the inclusion of purchases in small lots in the present regulations.

At the close of the evening session the delegates left for Ottawa, where they will wait upon the government at 11:30 o'clock tomorrow morning to present their views. The meeting will be continued in Ottawa, as the council has yet to decide whether or not they approve the amendments to the Canada grain act recommended by the royal commission.
