M. Painleve arrived at the palace of the Elysees at 2 p.m. to give his definite reply to President Doumergue. His visit followed closely assur-ances by the Socialists that they would participate in his government. According to the present arrange-ment, three Socialists will take office

ment, three Socialists will take office in the new ministry, two being Paul Boucour and Alexandre Varennes. Unless a change is made M. Briand will not take office. Painleve himself assuming the portfolio of foreign af-

Inspection of the burned buildings was made this morning by members of the firm of Beddome, Brown, Cronyn and Pocock, who carry in-surance on the orphanage. They stated the loss would not exceed \$25,000. Members of the fire depart-ment did excellent work in confining the blaze to the top storys alone,

they said. Reconstruction work will consist of the building of a new roof and renovation of the attic and fifth floors. This will be completed, it is expected, in short time. Beds have been arranged on the lower floors so that building operations will not interfere with the orphanage work.
