Port Stanley, Aug. 12—Undaunted by the leaden skies of morning that turned to heavy showers in the afternoon, the members and friends of the Irish Benevolent society held their 49th annual picnic here. 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Dick Fawcett responded for past presidents of I. B. S. and his suggestion that the Irish picnic next year be held on the Thursday of London's centennial week of celebration met with instant favor, and was adopted.
