PRIMARY SCHOOLS FAIL TO USE FREE ATHLETIC COACH

Report Shows Schools Most in
Need of Grats Training
Last To Ask For It.

COVERS PROVINCE

Toronto, Nov. 1.—The success attending the Ontario Athletic Commission in coaching the school boys of the province was outlined in a report submitted at the annual meeting of the commission held today. The report was adopted. It was pointed out that high schools and collegiate institutes showed a higher interest than public or separate schools, although coaches were available for elementary as well as secondary schools.

The report explained that the proposed branching out into coaching of group and other games in the schools, in addition to the teaching of the proper methods of performing athletic stunts, did not eventuate, for various causes, the chief of which was that the assignment of coaches for these games meant very heavy cost, which the finances would not allow.

As it was, the commission carried its athletic coaching into the schools of the province, as heretofore, with perhaps a better distribution. Walter Knox spent practically all his available time in this work, and while he could only give 97 days this year, as against 195 last year, his time was better distributed throughout the province. This is borne out by the fact that of the 97 days, only 11 days were spent in and about Toronto, as against 41 of the year before in this vicinity.

Covered Province.
"Mr. Knox pretty well covered the entire province," says the report, except the Ottawa district, for which the commission was fortunate enough to secure the services of Nick Bawlf during July. He is the coach for Cornell University. In this connection, it is necessary to call the attention of the commissioners to the fact that while the services of these two coaches were at the disposal of any and all applicants from the public and separate schools of the province, and preference given them, it was the collegiate institutes and high schools that were the most active in asking for this assistance. The commission safeguarded the interests of the lower grade schools by seeing to it that any visits to high schools were taken advantage of by the public and separate school pupils.

The policy of the commission has always been to send their coaches to centers preferably where home coaching is not available, and are usually the last to ask for this assistance, though every expense attached to these visits is met by the commission.

The commission supplied the medals for the Ontario public, separate and high school meet at Brantford; the medals for the junior events of the Ottawa Valley meet; the material and prizes for the sports at the cadet camp at Kingston, the Branch (2), and London, with the men to plan and carry the sport to a successful issue at these camps. These cadet camps cost the commission in the neighborhood of \$1,300.

Distribute Rule Books.
The commission continued to distribute the rule books of the various games to any school applying, and many that did not. As a result, the greater part of the 15,000 copies were sent broadcast through the province. The book was invaluable, and the demand correspondingly great. Some provision should be made to supply these rules to the schools as annually amended. Of the total income of \$11,242.94 of the commission for the year, \$3,323.34 was expended in athletic coaching of the schools. There is on deposit to the commission's credit on Oct. 31 the sum of \$12,528.90.

This income was derived from 41 professional boxing shows, as against a total of 50 the year before and 60 the year before that. Toronto, Hamilton and Windsor were the main centers, with smaller shows at St. Catharines, Fort Erie, London, Kingston, The Soo, Port Arthur and Fort William.

After outlining the boxing shows held during the past year in Toronto, the report continued:

"Boxing shows in other parts of the province were conducted with decorum and in keeping with the best traditions of sport."

"The commission continued to grow on hippodroming and ballyhooing at the fall fairs and at circuses, and, with the assistance of the provincial police, reduced the nuisance to a minimum."

"A rule was passed safeguarding amateur boxers from unscrupulous managers, making it obligatory on amateurs contemplating turning pro to file their intention with the commission for at least three months."

"The commission has also repeated its stand that preference be given to scientific boxing, rather than slugging."
