#### Rev. John Griffith Recounts Ex- Infant Son of Mr. and Mrs. Sharp periences During Boxer Rising in 1900 in China

Rev. John Griffith, a missionary in Honan, China, at present home on furlough, delivered an address on the Boxer rising of 1900 at a meeting in terian Church, held under the auspices of the W. T. M. S.

Rev. Mr. Griffith was in China as and, in company with other missionaries, made his way out of the country, only a few of a series of remarkable escapes, some of which he narrated by special request.

He prefaced his address by speaking of the causes of the trouble, which he contributed to commercial activity and missionary work, as well as to the effect of the Boer war and to no live fanaticism and superstitution. latter element was illustrated by the fact that one of the riots was caused by natives catching sight of a woman cleaning the upper windows of a house and coming to the conclusion that she was making signs

to the heavens.

As soon as it became evident that trouble was coming, Mr. Griffith was asked by the Christian Chinese to 'eave, and did so. He formed one of a party of about sixteen Christians who set out from Honan on a threeweeks' trip to the south, the authorities having refused to let them go by the shorter and more accustomed route to the north.

During their journey they escaped death by the narrowest margin more than once.
