Banker, who are holders of bonds of the Consolidated Tobacco Company and claim that their holdings would be injured by the carrying out of the proposed merger.

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CARRIE NATION JAILLED.

Wichita, Kas., Sept. 30.—Mrs. Carrie Nation and three other women broke into a large drug-store yesterday afternoon. One man offered ball and it was rejected. He became abusive and he was locked up in an adjoining cell. The women knelt in a circle and have been engaged in prayer most of the time since they were arrested. About 11 o'clock the hatchet was taken from her and one other woman had a hammer and they both smashed the retail of their windows, which they claim they cherish.

TO PROTECT CIGAR SMOKERS.

Havana, Oct. 1.—The members of the Cigar Manufacturers Association vigorously urge the Cuban government to present to the United States its alleged injustice in removing the distinctive stamp on imported cigars. It is urged that the government should prohibit the consumption of cigars made in the United States containing mixed or otherwise inferior products.

WAR SUMMARY.

While admitting that important developments are proceeding on the east flank of the Manchurian army, the Russian war office withholds details. It is surmised, however, that the movements in progress have for their object the defeat of the Japanese flanking movement against the Russian front. It is also indicated that the Japanese are still pushing across the Amur river to the northeast.

RUSSIAN RETREAT AGAIN REPORTED

Correspondents With Japanese Army Repeat Rumor of Retreat.

London, Sept. 30.—There is again today notably rumors of news from the East, accompanied by the activity usual in such cases of rumors concerning the condition of Port Arthur. Correspondents with the Japanese army report in the Daily Mail that the Japanese are withdrawing from Mukden and reports from Chinese sources at Harbin fix November 4th as the date for the Japanese attack on Mukden.
