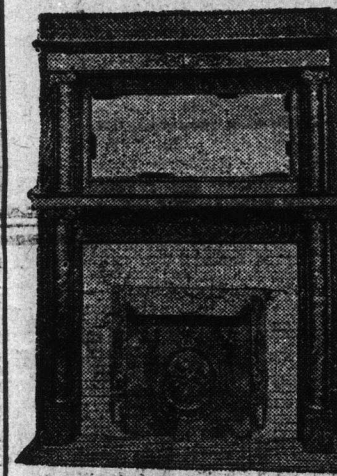

UNUSUAL BONBONS

English Bacteriologist Provides Preparation of Milk to Furnish Blue Bacilli

LONDON, Oct. 28.—The most remarkable brand of chocolate creams ever placed on the market is now on sale here. They are nothing less than a British bacteriologist's daring solution of the problem set by Prof. Elie Metchnikoff, of the Pasteur Institute in Paris, who urged the taking of sour milk or lactic acid for arresting old age, but who, scientist-like, omitted to say how the nauseating effects attendant on the administration of "health milk" to those with delicate organs could be avoided.

Every bonbon is guaranteed to contain at least 10,000,000 carefully isolated lactic acid or massol bacilli in the highest state of activity. The blue massol bacillus, as Prof. Metchnikoff pointed out, is not only the sworn foe of the red bacillus-coccus communis, or putrefaction microbe—but its undisputed master. The blue army of bacilli have no sooner been liberated in the human system by the swallowing of a bonbon than they begin at once to declare war on the red army of putrefaction microbes, until at the end of a few weeks at most, by the swallowing of three bonbons daily, the reds have been routed.

The strange bonbon was exhibited publicly for the first time at a private reception which signalled the opening of the annual London medical exhibition "for doctors only" at the Royal Horticultural Hall, Westminster, and caused intense interest among the medical men present.

Lake Captain Disappears.
OGDENSBURG, N. Y., Oct. 26.—Captain Lewis Holmes, of Milwaukee, commander and part owner of the lake freighter Omaha, which arrived here yesterday from Chicago with corn, has disappeared, and the police of the large lake cities have been asked to look for him. First Mate G. C. Smith reported to the authorities last night that for some time Captain Holmes had been erratic, due perhaps to worry owing to the loss of two men overboard from another command.

NEW FACTOR IN ELECTION CAMPAIGN

Richard McBride, Jr., Arrives to Participate, But Will Content Himself With Home Affairs.

Among the arrivals in the city on Sunday last—just in time to file claims for a share of the Thanksgiving-turkey and to indirectly assist in the political campaign—was Mr. Richard McBride, Jr., who is receiving a select few of the most intimate friends of the family at the home of his parents, the Premier and Mrs. McBride, Gorge road.

Although he has not expressed himself on the subject of publication, it is natural that the new arrival should experience some regret that he is a few scant days too late to get on the voters' list, for which he is in every way qualified except as to the conditions governing age and length of residence in the country.

Incidentally it may be said with confidence that the Premier, Vancouver Island and the most promising, and British Columbia on the whole as the best governed section of the world he has ever visited, while Victoria is unquestionably the most charming and in every way delightful residential centre he has ever seen.

It is understood that Mr. McBride, Jr., will take no active personal part in the present campaign, although seemingly naturally endowed with many of the qualifications of the perfect orator. Instead he will content himself for the present with the general direction of affairs at home while his father tours the Province elucidating the issues of the hour for the benefit of the electorate. In the father's absence, responsibilities naturally devolve upon the son and heir, and the newly arrived elector while happy in the possession of several sisters, has no brothers.

The advent of the first son in the household was the occasion of much rejoicing in the Premier's home on Sunday morning, and made the Thanksgiving season peculiarly significant and apropos. Today the congratulations that have showered down both at the First Minister's offices and at his home have been of distinctly varied nature—domestic as well as public and political.

And no one can for a moment question that the new arrival has the appearance at this particular psychological moment but to bring good luck both to his parents and to British Columbia.

EXTENSION DISASTER

Inquest is Again Adjourned for Further Examination in Regard to Alleged Shot

NANAIMO, Oct. 28.—The inquiry into the recent colliery disaster at Extension, which opened at Lady Smith on Wednesday, was concluded Saturday as far as taking evidence was concerned. The jury returned no verdict, but will meet again in a week's time, when they will have an opportunity of looking over the depositions.

Yesterday Chief Inspector of Mines P. H. Shepherd, Provincial Mineralogist Wm. P. Robertson, and Mining Expert Jas. Ashworth gave evidence. Mr. Shepherd gave a very full and detailed report of the disaster at the mine, and his conclusions were supported by Mr. Robertson.

Mr. Ashworth, a mining expert, however, differed in his conclusions, and as a result the inquest was adjourned to allow of a further examination of all the evidence. Mr. Ashworth states that he found evidence of a shot having been fired. In order to clear up this matter of a shot in the mine, the inquest was adjourned so as to allow of the shot being examined.

At Saturday's sitting, men who examined the place gave evidence and stated that in their opinion the shot had done its work well.

LIVE NEWS OF THE PROVINCE

Mann Delayed.

Owing to the wreck of a freight train at Ruby creek, No. 96, due to arrive at Kamloops at 5 p. m., was delayed several hours, not reaching this city until close on 9 o'clock last Friday afternoon. D. D. Mann, vice-president of the C. N. R., was a passenger on this train and the committee that was to have met him at Ashcroft last night left on the noon train in the hope of connecting with No. 96 at Savona. The committee consisted of Mayor Robinson, Ald. J. Brown, C. W. Hallamore, president of the board of trade, and Dr. M. S. Wade, vice-president.

First B. C. Paper.
A sample of the first paper manufactured at Port Mellon, B. C., by the British Columbia Paper and Pulp Co., was received at the Nanaimo Herald office the other day. The company seems to be going ahead in the best way and have the united best wishes of the newspapers of the Coast in their endeavor to supply the growing demand for news and information. The white paper is of a high quality and reasonable prices inaugurated.

Double Hanging.
Kamloops jail is to be the scene of a double hanging in December next. A white man and an Indian, will, on that occasion, pay the penalty of the brutal murder of an Indian woman, committed at Kamloops some time ago. The condemned murderers were brought into Kamloops jail yesterday evening by Constable Burr, of Ashcroft. They had been tried and found guilty at the Clinton assizes before Mr. Justice Morritt. The white man named Robert Walker and William Chinley is the Indian.

Nicola's Journal.
S. N. Dancy has purchased a half-interest in the Nicola Herald. He will take over the editorial and business management of the paper, the present proprietor continuing in charge of the mechanical and M. M. Dancy will install a complete new outfit of type, etc., including a typesetting machine. As has been pretty generally known, of late, Mr. Dancy is a candidate for the Tory nomination in West Yale and with that object in view he will tonight sever his connection with the Kamloops Standard and move into the Yale district, visiting points in the constituency along the line as far as Asquith.

Expensive Buggy.
The Vernon News correspondent from Penticton says: There is at present a baby carriage for sale in Penticton and we rather doubt if a buyer will be found as the price is rather high. One of our merchants in Penticton, over the catalogue of Toronto firm saw a remarkably pretty baby carriage marked \$23.75; he showed the ad. to a customer and the latter, who needed something of the sort, ordered it. The carriage arrived due course, also a freight note for \$30.00, making the total cost \$53.75. Of course the customer refused to take the carriage and the merchant is still cursing the ad. for charging such exorbitant rates.

New Steel Works.
One of the largest deals in real estate that has been consummated in this city for some time was closed out the other afternoon when the James I. Moore Company of Seattle, one of the largest iron works on the Pacific Coast, purchased about two and a half miles of waterfront, or to be exact, 11,000 feet, on the south side of the Fraser river, above the Fraser bridge, together with a large acreage on the river flats, back of the waterfront for a sum aggregating considerably over \$300,000. The purchase was made by White & Shiles of the city, acting for the J. I. Moore Company. It is the intention of the company to erect a large iron and steel works on this property in the near future.

Spokane's Show.
The Arrow lakes and Nelson districts will combine in a two-day exhibition of apples to the great continental apple show at Spokane, Wash., on November 15-16. This gratifying news was announced yesterday. Not only will the Kootenay country have an adequate exhibit, but the exhibit will be adequately exhibited, for J. E. Anderson of Nelson, and P. G. Paquet of Arrow lakes, will go to Spokane in charge of the combined exhibit. This gratifying news has but new life into the rivalry among individual ranchers to be represented by entries at the great show, and the completeness of the arrangements being made ensures that the best of the current crop from the entire Kootenay will be sent to Spokane.

Boundary Prosperous.
"The Boundary towns appear very prosperous and business of all kinds is active," said Fred Starkey, on his return from a three-day trip to the Boundary. "The town of Grand Forks, in particular, is doing a great deal of business. The Royal and Eastern railways are building on prominent corners. Phoenix is also apparently doing well, and all the mines are working, with the exception of the Dominion Copper, where there is a dispute over arrears of wages."

GRUESOME STORY

Chaufeur Leach Testifies as to Dr. Fritch's Disposal of Body of Miss Millman

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 26.—Chaufeur Jos. W. Leach yesterday, at the examination of Dr. Geo. A. Fritch on the charge of manslaughter in connection with the mysterious death of Miss Mabelle Millman, testified that he took the physician to Coors creek in his automobile, and that Dr. Fritch threw into the creek three sacks which they had brought from his office.

It was after Leach had made a confession to the police several weeks ago that Dr. Fritch was re-arrested in connection with the death of Miss Millman. Leach testified that on August 27th Dr. Fritch telephoned to Mrs. Leach that he wanted to see her husband. Leach accordingly went to see the doctor. He testified that Dr. Fritch told him he was in trouble and that he wanted a friend to help him.

Then, said Leach, Dr. Fritch asked him if he knew of any deep water readily accessible. "Have you been killing somebody?" Leach said he asked Dr. Fritch. "You are not supposed to know," was the answer.

Leach then arranged to come back to the doctor's office later in the night. According to his testimony, Dr. Fritch brought out to the automobile three sacks. They drove to the physician's house, where the sacks were secured and placed in the back of the car. Leach said that the doctor stood on the running board of the machine as they drove over the Coors river bridge, and opening the door of the tonneau, lifted out the sacks and threw them over the railing into the water. Then they drove back to the subject.

The dismembered sections of the body of Miss Millman were found in Coors creek and the lower Detroit river in three sacks, which had been weighted down with bricks.

Dr. Fritch was held for trial in the recorder's court on the charge of manslaughter by means of a criminal offense in connection with the death of Miss Mabelle Millman, of Annapolis. Dr. Fritch's bail was fixed at \$10,000, with two sureties.

WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 26.—A stirring address by Dr. O. Edward Janney, of Bedford, the Canadian, who was arrested in this city October 11 charged on his own confession with the murder of Ethel Kinnrade, at Hamilton, Ontario, was again remanded in the Bow street court pending inquiry into the case. Detective Inspector Kidd informed the magistrate that it was now known the prisoner had given a wrong name and that his statement was incorrect in other particulars.
