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A RAISE IN THE RATES. Of Over Two Mills Above Last Year's. Necessary to Cover the Estimated Expenses for 1884.

Chairman Denison, Ald. F. C. Denison, Moore, Maughan, Lobb, Eblevin, Lovell, Elliott and Carlyle were present at the meeting of the executive committee yesterday afternoon. Applications for increased grants were received from W. H. Howland, Prison aid association; D. A. O'Sullivan, house of providence; Senator Allen, Horticultural secretary. The house of the good shepherd, Parkdale, and the eye and ear infirmary also asked for grants. All the applications will be considered when the estimates come up for discussion next week.

Treasurer Harman presented his schedule of estimated expenditure for the coming year. He mentioned that the present sum involved in his present assessment of city treasurer ten years ago was only \$700,000, while this year the amount totalled \$2,352,000. To meet this expenditure there is a surplus of \$20,220 from the present year's output to carry forward.
