A correspondent of the Halifar Chronicle, who had an interview did not find any of the party very communicative as to why they did not bring the much talked of the failure is that the gear of the Hope was not powerful enough to raise the great mass. The Cornell party under Prof. Tarr during their months stay at Nugsuak made a care-ful study of the large double glacier which they discovered and which they called the Cornell glacier, made a valuable botanical collection, spent some time in the study of invertebrate zoology and made a careful ex-smination of crystaline rocks under the su-pervision of Prof. Gill. As is well known Greenland is covered with ice except the peninsulas around the edge of the coast. The Cornell party went inland over the ice caps aix or seven miles, and while there discovery " Mount Schur-man," in honor of the president of Cornell university, who is well known in Halifax. During the stay at Nugunak the party lived in tents and had plenty of shooting. Mr. Putnam, with the Benton party of the U. S. coast survey dopartment, made a series of pendulum and magnetic observations for the purpose of measuring the force of gravity which, as is well known, increases from the equator to the poles on account of the flat-tening of the earth at the poles. 
