The fighting at this point was very severe and the officer himself bayonetted several Germans and killed others with bombs, gaining possession of the trench and establishing a block. By his prompt action he broke up the enemy counter attack and compelled them to execute the supker road. It them to evacuate the sunken road. It is estimated that at least a hundred German casualties were caused through the determination and courage of this officer. Throughout the ations he showed great gallantry


