An exchange says: Italy would seemingly gain by the cession of the Lronine City; for she would secure a moral and social coslescence of her citizens Such unity would give her now pational importance. Italy owes a large debt to the l'ope to day. Ile has never touched one penny of the Papal patrimony voted in 1877 as a yearly income. The total amount due this jear aggregates $\$ 14,885,000$. The cession of Leonine City would wipe out this obligation. The union of King and Pope in Italy does not seem such an impossible thing. after all.
It is believed that the fortune left by the Cumte de Paris amounts to about four millions sterling. As a struct Frenchman, the deceased Prince's wealch wall in all probability be dividod amongst his family, in accurdanco with French law, each member, inoluding the Countess of Paris, not being entitled to more than one-fourth, and the rest of the properts, special legacies excepted, being shared among the Royal Family in equal portions.

One of the reductio al absuadum nmendments offered in the Constitutional Convention at Albany was proposed by Mr. Cassidy in these words : "No local Board of Education shall employ any school teacher who espouser any religious sect, nor shall any teacher who is employed appear in the garb of a nan, the cassock of a priest, the close buttoned coat of an episcopal reotor, the white necktio of a Methodist minister, the stern coun. tenance of a Presbyterian, or the lank figure of a Baptisi ; nor in the severe simplicits of a Slaker or tho choap matorial affected by the Society of Friends. By a formal enactment, Joan of Are has recently been made the patron saint of the Third Republic. France, after five centuries, still lovingly cherishes the memory of the hercio shepherd girl of Domremy, and following close apon her eleration by the Fathers of the Church to the first stop towards sainthood, the Ohamber of Deputies has ordered that her birthday shall be observed as a national holidas. This official action is due in large measure to the energy and persistenco of Jules Farro, a member of the Frenoh Sonste, with whom the Maid of Ofleans has long been a grand passion, but it also smakens a responsive echo in thé popalar French heart, in which she has long been enshrined as the grand cat and noblest woman her race jet producea.

A great deal of interest has been aroused by the announcement on tho

Russia is said to be mobilising hor fleet in the vicinity of the present seat of war. The Bear is said to be opposed unalterably to the occupation of Corea by Japan and is preparing to assert his claim. Un tho other hand, a report bas just been received that Japan has arranged with Russia and Frarce for backing, in fhich case the Russian fleet will be ready, not to interfere with the already successfal Japanese, but to assist them. This combination, it is thought, would drive Great Britain to support tho Chinese.
