An Appeal,

Fr. Michael O'Donoghue, parish priest of Arran Island, Galway, has issued an appeal on behalf of a fund which is being raised to provide the islanders with pro-per fishing boats, and to which Mr. James McLaren Smith has contributed £250.

Died.

Sister Gabriel de Marie, of the Little Sisters of the Poor, died on January 20, at St. Joseph's House, Waterford. She was a native of Belgium, was in the thirty-fourth year of her age and the twelfth of her religious life.

Sister John, of the order of St. John of God, Sallyfield, died on the 28th ult. She was known in the world as Miss Byrne, and was from Glentague, County Wicklow. Sister John was in the seven teenth year of her religious life.

Two Tenants Evicted at Lisgoold.

In pursuance of an ejectment decree granted by the Recorder of Cork, last October, for non-payment of rent, Denis and Patrick McGrath were evicted from their holding in the townland of Lisgoold, near Midleton, on January 28. Judge Warren is the real owner of the lands, but the evicting landlords, who are middlemen under him, are John Ahern and Patrick Keegan, of Carrigadrohoid. A party of police from the Ballineurrig station attended to protect the sheriff's representatives, but possession was formally obtained without any resistance.

Action Against the Freeman's Journal. In Dublin, on Jan. 28, before the Chief Justice and a special jury, an action by David Sheeby against the Freeman's Journal was resumed. The plaintiff complained of a paragraph stating that at the funeral of the late O'Gorman Mahon he had said to Mr. Parnell in the cemetary, "Your conduct is disgraceful; you ought to get into the man's grave." Mr. Sheehy denied uttering these words, and brought an action for libel. The defendants apologized, and paid £100 into court, but at the first trial the jury disagreed. The re-hearing on January 28 resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff of £500, beyond

Father Clarke of Easkey Released from Jail.

the £100 paid into court.

Father Clarke of Easkey, who has been imprisoned in Sligo jail for the past three months, in default of finding bail to be of good behavior, was released on January 25. The charge against him was of intimidating John Clarke a land-grabber at Easkey. The reverend gentleman during the recent elections was a strong Parnellite, but is now a Nationalist. Immediately after leaving the prison he had breakfast at Mayor Higgins' residence. Father Flanagan and Mr. Thomas Keating were among the other guests of the Mayor. Father Clarke looks none the worse for his imprisonment, and states that he had every attention from the officials. He left at twelve o'clock for Ballina to attend the golden jubilee of the Bishop of Killala.

The Very Rev. Bernard O'Neill, of Bag-nalstown, Dead.

The death occurred on January 27 of the Very Rev. Bernard O'Neill, pastor of Bagnalstown. Father O'Neill had filled some of the most important charges in the dioceses of Kildare and Leighlin. He was for some years administrator of the Mensal parish of Carlow, and later was promoted to the parochial charge of Graiguenamanagh. On the death of Father Morrin, V.F., Father O'Neill accepted the parish of Bagnalstown, and was named Vicar-Forane. He always took a prominent part in politics, and assisted in the work of routing the Torics from the representation of Carlow, after an unchallenged tenure of twentyeight years. In the contest for the county last July, Father O'Neill separated himself from the majority of the people of the county, and supported Mr. Parnell'a nominee.

Death of Canon Rice of Charleville.

The Very Rev. James Canon Rice, P.P., of Charleville, died on the evening of January 23, aged seventy-one years. At an early age he entered Maynooth College, and having passed through a course of studies, was elected to the Dunboyne establishment, and subsequently ap-pointed to the chair of dogmatic theology in the Irish College, Paris. While acting as professor he won the esteem of the students, many of whom hold exalted positions in the Church, by his accurate knowledge as well as by his genial manner. He was regarded by those who knew him as the personification of truth and honor. From this college he was promoted to responsible positions on the missions of his native diocese of Cloyne. Kind, tender and open-handed towards the needy, he spared no toil or trouble to benefit his parishioners. Whatever worldly goods he possessed were left for charitable purposes.

Ravages of Influenza in Cork.

The influenza epidemic is working very serious ravages in Midleton and vicinity, particularly in the parish of Cloyne. The pastor of the latter parish, Canon Murphy, has been laid up for the Baltimore, 22 and 21 East Baltimore Street, past six weeks from its ill effects, and at New York, Washington, Species present lies in a serious condition. It has been observed that the chapel bell in Cloyne is telling daily for some dead person, and on one day seven funerals took place. Owing to the iliness of the above named priests no Mass has been recently celebrated at Ballycotton, as Father O'Riordan, of Cloyne, could only attend to Churchtown and Shanagarry.

Rellet for Evicted Tenants.

Four families were evicted on January 23, and three the next day, under circum stances of great hardship, from the estate of Mr. Wynne, D.L., of Hazelwood, County Leitrim. Owing to the low prices of cattle, the tenants were unable to meet their liabilities. At the weekly meeting of the Board of Guardians on January 28, John Dolan (chairman) predang, the evicted families, numbering in all thirty-five souls, applied for outdoor relief, as they were refused readmission to their homes, and had to depend on the charity of their friends and neighbors for food and shelter. The part of the estate on which the eviction took place, which is in the parish of Drumkeeran, some miles distance from the town, and on the Killarga electoral division, Mano, caminon Union, is for the most part a cold, dreasy waste of bog and more and. The Guardians agreed to give provincial outdoor relief to the extent of E3 each in five of the cases, 10s, each in the other two, amounting it all to 26 per week.
