

Marlin-Bennett R. Food Fights: International Regimes and the Politics of Agricultural Trade Disputes. Langhorne, Pennsylvania: Gordon & Breach Science Publishers, 1993. Provides reflective analyses of international institutions. Regimes theory is re-conceptualized and through empirical study it is demonstrated how international trade practices are reshaped by diverse contenders for lead positions in the world economic order.

Mistry P.S. Regional Integration Arrangements in Economic Development: Panacea or Pitfall. Fondad, The Hague, 1996. Reviews issues arising from experience with arrangements for regional economic cooperation and integration in the developing and developed regions. Offers detailed insights and policy suggestions on certain issues.

Nishijima S. and Smith P.H. eds. Cooperation or Rivalry? Colorado: Westview Press, 1996. Focuses on regional integration concepts. Analyzes the extra-regional implications of NAFTA and the possible Free Trade Agreement of the Americas. The volume offers interesting analysis of the varied interests and motives of the major players in North and South America and those of the Asian countries.

OECD. Workshop Papers compiled in The New World Trading System: Readings. OECD, Paris, 1994. Contributors to the volume are leading experts on various aspects of the international trading system.

OECD. Regionalism and its Place in the Multilateral Trading System. OECD, Paris, 1996. A collection of workshop papers on the subject. Together, the papers offer rich insights into regional integration initiatives (APEC, Europe and the Americas) and regional approaches to rule making. They suggest ways to ensure synergy between regionalism and multilateralism. They point to a new set of issues relevant for an informed debate and to the need for a fresh approach monitoring the evolution and impact of regionalism.

OECD. Regional Integration and the Multilateral Trading System: Synergy and Divergence. OECD, 1995. Focuses on implications for trade policy makers and negotiators of the proliferation of regional arrangements, including the European Union and NAFTA.

Preeg E.H. Trade Policy Ahead: Three Tracks and One Question. Washington, D.C.: Center for Strategic and International Studies, 1995. Examines the changing structure of world trade and investment and relates this to the current state of the three track trading system (multilateral commitments, regional free trade agreements and selective bilateral arrangements) vis-a-vis the WTO. The analysis leads to a recommended course of trade policy based on the concept of a "three convergent track " strategy.
