STRIKE OF MECHANICS—COMMUNICATIONS PEQUESTING GOVERNMENT INTERVENTION

Mr. Warren Allmand (Notre-Dame-de-Grâce): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Labour which is supplementary to the one asked by the hon. member for Central Nova (Mr. MacEwan) relating to the Air Canada strike. Will the minister say whether he has received letters and telegrams from the Canadian people asking him to take action on the strike, and settle it?

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I wonder whether the question as asked is proper. I do not think it is proper to ask simply whether

the minister has received letters, telegrams or representations.

Mr. Allmand: May I rephrase the question, Mr. Speaker?

Hon. Bryce S. Mackasey (Minister of Labour): Mr. Speaker, I received three telegrams suggesting that I join the New Democratic party, one suggesting that I was a communist, three others, I believe, suggesting compulsory arbitration, and several serious telegrams from other groups of people. Certain union groups within Air Canada are protesting the use of non-union personnel within the company. That, I think, is hardly conducive to good industrial relations for the future within the company.

Mr. J. P. Nowlan (Annapolis Valley): Are we to take it from the minister's answer, Mr. Speaker, that he will be activated and stimulated in proportion to the number of letters and telegrams he receives from Canadians in such a national emergency?

Mr. Mackasey: It will take more than a telegram to get me to join the N.D.P.
