PERU-ASSISTANCE TO EARTHQUAKE VICTIMS

Mr. James E. Walker (Parliamentary Secretary to Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, the House is aware of the tragic situation now faced by the government and the people of Peru in the wake of the devastating earthquakes which spread through that country a few days ago. Since that time the Canadian government has been examining on an urgent basis the requests of the Peruvian government for relief assistance in an effort to determine the quickest and most effective way in which Canada could come to the assistance of the victims of what will certainly prove to be one of the greatest calamities of this century.

Hon. members will recall that the Prime Minister indicated in this chamber a day or so ago the immediate cash grant of \$25,000 to the Canadian Red Cross Society for relief purposes in Peru. The Prime Minister now wishes the House to know that the government has this afternoon authorized the immediate dispatch to Peru of six Canadian armed forces aircraft for use in ferrying relief supplies into the affected areas. Five of these aircraft are of the Caribou variety designed for operation in challenging airstrip conditions. The other is a Hercules transport which will act as a mother-ship for the navigational assistance of the Caribou. These aircraft will depart from their bases in Canada during the course of the evening and will be available to the Peruvian authorities immediately on their arrival in that country early next week. The government is continuing its examination of other means by which it can come to the assistance of the earthquake victims.

I wish to thank hon. members, Mr. Speaker, for their courtesy in permitting me to revert to motions to make this statement on behalf of the Prime Minister.

Assistance to Peruvian Earthquake Victims

Hon. J. A. MacLean (Malpeque): Mr. Speaker, I congratulate the government for seeking practical means of expressing in a practical way the humanitarian feelings of the people of Canada for the citizens of Peru who have suffered this catastrophe. I think that the Canadian people will be pleased to know that some of our armed forces aircraft have been dispatched to render aid in this situation.
