If he did that and lived with those people for a week in the conditions they have to live under, and on their income, perhaps he would come back to this House with a better appreciation of what housing means.

Mr. Alexander: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order. I have listened to the hon. member and I feel he is overstepping his bounds. I think this should be more or less a question of privilege. If the hon. member had guts enough to come out and say what he intended to say, then perhaps I would not have stood up. But I think the hon. member has attempted to imply that there are a number of blacks in Nova Scotia who happen to be living in such circumstances and there may be need for recognition of their plight. Surely we all know that these circumstances need to be dealt with regardless of a person's race, creed or colour.

Mr. Basford: Hear, hear!

Mr. Alexander: I think all of us in this House are very much aware of the circumstances, whether people are black or white. What I resent is the cheap NDP way that the hon. member for Skeena (Mr. Howard) is known for in terms of trying to embarrass me. I do not appreciate that.
