

## DISTRICT of QUEBEC.

**W**HEREAS by an Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council of this Province, bearing date the 16th January, 1779, intituled, An Ordinance for continuing an Ordinance made the 23d of April, in the seventeenth year of his Majesty's Reign, empowering the Commissioners of the Peace, to regulate the Police of the towns of Quebec and Montreal;

It is ordered and required, that the Commissioners of the Peace, in their Quarter-sessions, do fix and regulate, as often as they shall see occasion, the rates that shall be paid for the carriage of any goods on any cart, truck or sled, within the towns of Quebec and Montreal, also such regulations as they may judge necessary for the police of the said towns.

In pursuance thereof, at a Court of General Quarter-sessions of the Peace, held in the city of Quebec, for the district of Quebec, on Tuesday the 8th day of October, 1782, and continued by adjournment to the third day of November, 1782, by the Commissioners of the Peace then present, It is ordered and directed as follows, viz.

*Regulations for the Carters.*

I. For the carriage of every load, consisting of four barrels or eight bags of flour, or four barrels of loaf sugar, bread, pease, or wheat, three barrels of melasses, brown or powder sugar, brandy, pitch, tar, turpentine, pork or beef, or of two hogsheads or one pipe or puncheon of wine, rum, brandy, sugar, tobacco, or water, or other goods of the same weight, taken up on the Beach in the Lower-town, or on the King's Wharf, and carried to any other part of the Lower-town, as far as Mr. Lymburner's Wharf, there shall be paid fifteen coppers, or the value thereof, except melasses taken up and carried as aforesaid, for which there shall be paid one shilling.
