"BACK TO THE FARM?" "NOT ME," SAID MARY. A Tragedy of the Footlights—Lure of the Dime Vaudeville Was Too Strong.

CHATHAM, Nov. 10.—(Special)—Stranded in Chatham after a short career as an actress on the Dixie Vaudeville Circuit, seventeen-year-old Mary McLellan of Big Point, Ont., heaped scornful rebuke on her mother and brother when they came here to take her home.

"Back to dreary old Big Point," she cried derisively. "What for—to marry a farmer and never know anything but milking cows and washing dishes—all my life? Not me. Send me to jail if you like, but I won't go back."

Mary hooked up with a ten-cent theatre actor some weeks ago and ran away from home.

The guided male partner left her stranded in Chatham, but Mary had the bug to become a dazzling queen of the footlights, with bouquets and table d'hote, and when her mother sought her out, she made a scene on the street.

Mrs. McLellan sought out the executive officer of the Children's Aid Society, and Mary was turned over to the sisters of the Ursuline convent in the hope that they may be able to dissuade her from her stubborn purpose.

The McLellans are well-to-do farmers at Big Point, where Mary has a good home. When she arrived in Chatham, her mother was shocked to find her attired in a flaming costume of scarlet, with hat to match.

HEWGILL FREED BY LAW. Exonerated from blame for the death of the Chinese lad, whose life was crushed out by his motor car in the darkness at the corner of Homewood-avenue and Carlton-street, Stephen Hewgill was yesterday also cleared of the charge of manslaughter, which has stood against him in police court.

Crown Attorney Corley asked permission to withdraw the charge in the absence of evidence, stating at the same time that he entirely concurred in the finding of the coroner's jury, which had found Hewgill blameless.

RAILLESS CAR SYSTEM. Another scheme to better Toronto's citizen-carrying services is being considered by the city engineer. It is that of the railless trolley, similar to the system in use in Leeds and Bradford, in England.

The current for these cars is supplied by an overhead wire. The car is steered by the motorman, and cars swing to either side in order to pass other vehicles.

TENDERS FOR TUBES VARIED CONSIDERABLY Highest One Was Twice as Great as the Lowest—Details Given Out.

More than double the lowest was the highest tender for the tube system. A partial report of the tenders with the totals figured up, was presented to the board of control by the city engineer yesterday. The highest tender was that of the Anglo-Canadian Contractors, Ltd., whose figure was \$5,195,542.

The lowest was that of Haney, Quinlan & Robertson, of \$2,474,781. The tenders are for the excavation and concrete work, and are as follows:
