Railways Must Be More Considerate of Their Interests.

Ottawa, Jan. 4.-The railway comnission will very shortly issue an order bringing into effect the new car service rules that have been agreed upon after consultation with the railway interests and with shippers all over the Do-

Hereafter the companies must be le

Hereafter the companies must be less exacting in the imposition of what are known as demurrage charges. Moreover, where a shipping concern applies for so many cars per day the railways must make more of an effort to maintain a steady supply.

When the new car service rules go into effect the railway companies will be required to notify shippers of the arrival of any cars that the latter have ordered. Twenty-four hours will then be allowed for the shipper to say where he wants the car placed. Forty-eight hours after this again are given for the loading or unloading of the cars as the case may be, and it will only be further delays that will leave shippers further delays that will leave shippers open to demurrage charges. The rules will at first be only provisionally approved in order that the railway board may have an opportunity to remedy any defects that their enforcement may disclose Later on it will be for the commis sioners to consider whether they will make the railways liable for damages f shippers when the latter suffer fin-ancial loss thru delay in the supply of

Radial Railway Representatives to Meet Government To Day-Notes From Parliament Buildings.

The Ontario cabinet was in session for some time yesterday afternoon, but Premier Whitney stated afterwards that there was nothing to give out. The cabinet had expected to meet gentlemen who are interested in elec-tric, radial and steel railways, but the meeting will not be held till 4 o'clock this atternoon, when there will be a talk, which will be preliminary to the talk, which will be preliminary to the propositions which may in due time be presented for consideration by the government, when legislation is to be made governing radial lines at the approaching session of the legislature. The appointment was made with James Ealrd, representing the Scarboro Railway. The other roads will be represented and so will the city. Premier Whitney was asked if the government proposed to give Toronto an increase in representation in the legislature, and if the question of a redistribution would come up at the next session, but he simply replied that the government had been strongly pressed to institute an enquiry into corruption, as practiced in Kingston and other elections, that the cabinet had discussed it, and it will come up for further consideration. The proposition is that the enquiry be made by the committee on privileges and elections.
